THE FINALE

Ranking 4th defensively amongst the nation's teams, the St. Mary's Gaels today wind up their 1942 schedule with the Titans of Detroit.

St. Mary's record of 5 wins, 3 losses and 1 tie is not indicative of the well-coached and smoothly operating team that it proved itself to be in the campaign being completed. Bothered with lack of practice fields before the California game and plagued with injuries to key men after the U.S.F. contest, the Gaels demonstrated the spirit characteristic of their coaches, Jimmy Phelan and Marty Kordick, by digging in when the going was tough and making a close ball game out of every defeat. St. Mary's scored a total of 133 points against nine opponents, while allowing only 46 points to be chalked up against them, 20 of which were garnered by

Santa Clara. This gives the Gaels the ranking of fourth amongst the nation's teams defensively.

Today for the first time since early October the Phelanites will be at full force, with the possible exception of Roy Guisti who may play for only a short time, if at all. Five seniors will complete their gridiron career and engage in their last tussle for the Gaels. These men are Tony Compagno, Ray Curry, Tom Coll, Jim Powers and Al Ratto.

Of the Titans little is known except that their record to date is very impressive. In Gus Dorais, Detroit has one of the older and more famous coaches in the country. Even at full strength St. Mary's expects one of the toughest games of its schedule and a game worthy of a finale to a most successful season under one of the greatest coaches in the country today, Jimmy Phelan.

Unsportsmanlike conduct. (Penalty — 15 yards.) For flagrant unsportsmanlike conduct—15 yard penalty and disqualification.

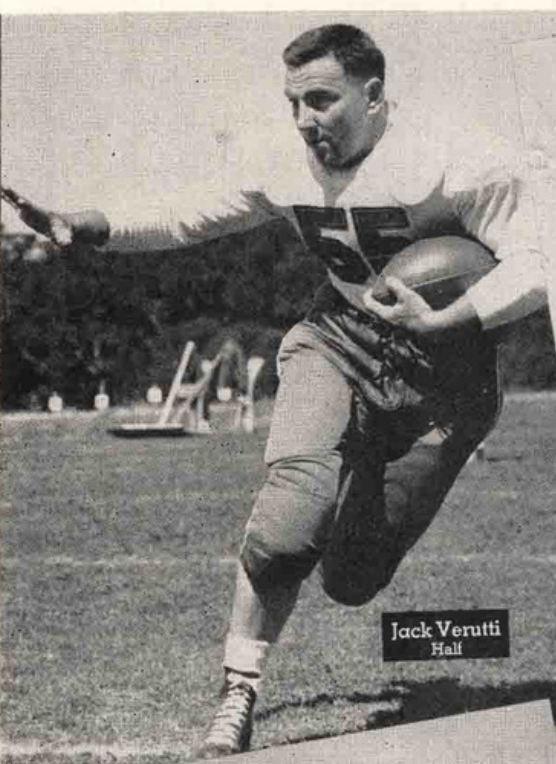

(If penalty on offense, when interference occurs beyond line of scrimmage, 15 yards and loss of down; on or behind line of scrimmage, loss of down only. Interference by defense, ball to offense on spot of foul as first down.)

GUS DORAIS

The Forward Pass and Knute Rockne

HAILING from Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, Gus Dorais distinguished himself in high school football to the extent of being named all-state quarterback. Attempting to enter Minnesota, Dorais was refused by Coach Harry Williams on the theory that he was "Too small for football". So Dorais journeyed onward to Notre Dame where he was accepted.

Being short of material, Notre Dame Coach Jess Harper wasn't turning up his nose at any boy who had a good high school reputation. It was very soon demonstrated that Gus Dorais could throw a football so well that he could drive tacks with it at 40 yards. They soon forgot that he was a little guy and hailed him as just the kind of marksman they had been looking for. In the same class as Dorais was a raw-boned Scandinavian by the name of Knute Rockne, who had the stickiest fingers for a football that ever grew on mortal man.

Dorais made the football team in his freshman year. But not until the fall of 1913 did that great passing combination of Dorais to Rockne receive national recognition. In November, 1913, Notre Dame went down to West Point to meet one of the most powerful Army teams that ever took the field. Dorais completed 12 successive passes to Rockne and others on the team and the final score was Notre Dame 35, West Point 13. The Army and spectators were bewildered. That game at West Point was the beginning of modern football, which makes Dorais and Rockne the parents. With the use of the forward

pass, football began to open up and to become the thrilling spectacle that it is today, instead of a dreary slugging match between groups of monsters in moleskins.

Upon graduation from Notre Dame, Dorais was signed up by Loras College in Iowa, then known as Dubuque College and later as Columbia. Gus taught smart, open football that he had played at South Bend, so that he was able to win 28 games and tie two of the 47 played in his four years at Columbia.

During the First World War Dorais enlisted and was assigned to Camp MacArthur, Texas, where he coached the camp football team, among other things, and garnered seven victories and one tie out of eight games played. In the fall of 1919 Gus took a job as backfield coach under his old pal Knute Rockne. That was the year when George Gip was running wild on the gridiron and George was generous in his appreciation of the help that Dorais was able to give him. In the fall of 1920, Dorais was made coach at Gonzaga University, where he remained for five years.

Finally after the 1924 season, Dorais was selected as athletic director and head football coach at the University of Detroit and has remained there ever since. Out of 141 games played, Dorais has emerged with 94 victories, 40 defeats and 7 ties.

It is with pride that the soft-spoken and lucid-teaching Dorais is welcomed to San Francisco with his Detroit Titans for the first time.

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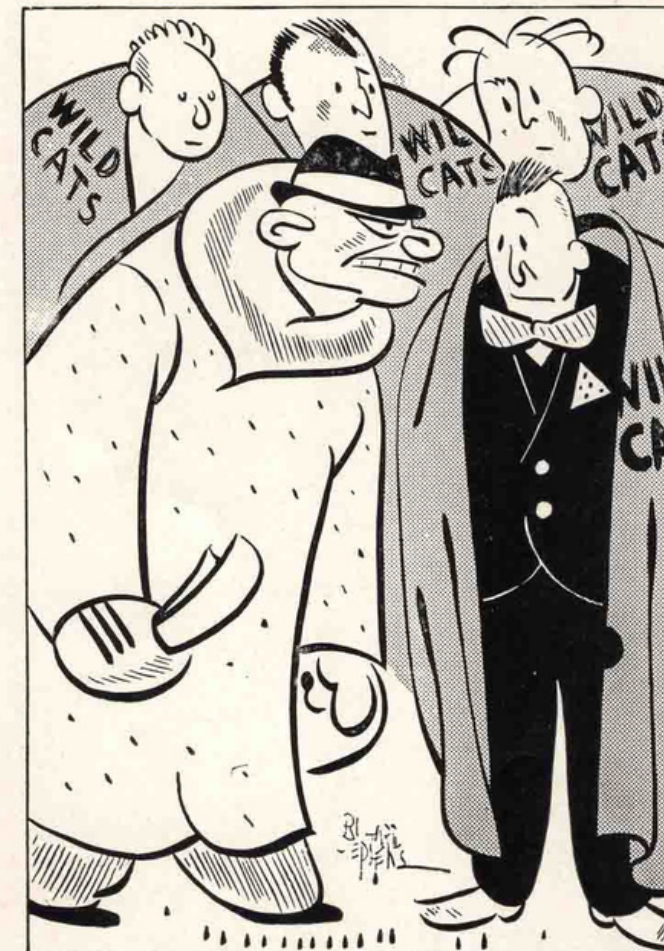

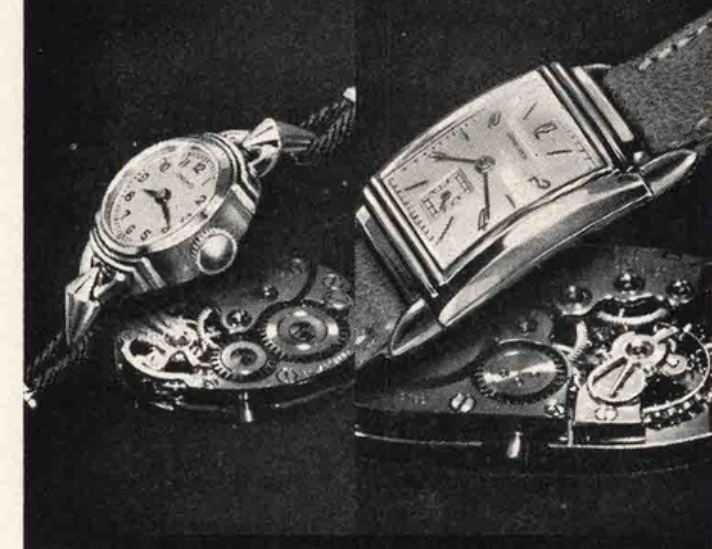

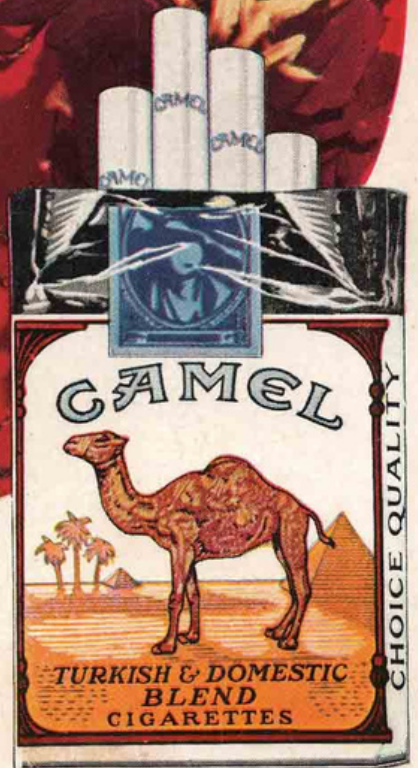
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
