Phantom Flyers

Burdened only with confidence and hope a new team of Gaels flash out of Moraga's rock-ribbed foothills today—returning to the Stadium Wars once again in quest of new and greater glories, and bringing with them a threat of fielding the most sizzling attack in the annals of Far-Western football.

Health of the parties concerned permitting, Coach Ed "Slip" Madigan will this afternoon send forth a backfield which he declares is potentially the greatest he ever directed. To date its only positive characteristic is speed, and it can probably average more yards per second than any backfield in the land.

Will it have the ability, the courage, the rhythm, the precision necessary? The next hour or so will tell and optimistic St. Mary's is willing to wager mightily that the report will be favorable. Isn't "Ambling Al" Nichelini the best all-around back in America? Didn't Ed Hallman run a hundred yards in 9.7 at the Fresno Relays? Can't Sir Malcolm Fiese punt better than any Gael back since Stennett? And who ever blocked better or hit harder than "Kelly" Kellogg?

St. Mary's may need those "Phantom Flyers" this afternoon. Coach Gene Murphy of Columbia, a former San Franciscan and graduate of Notre Dame, is given a chance at national grid renown if his team conquers. It will stage the same up-hill battle, desperately trying, never dying, that St. Mary's followers know so well.

"Slip" Madigan, starting his fourteenth year as top-coach at St. Mary's, is proud of the opportunity to give an old classmate and the school where he started his coaching career a chance at the greater glory.

How fleet the works of time! Yesterday's stepchild is today's fairy godmother!

Only two of last year's regulars will take their places in the Gael's forward wall this afternoon. "Kezar" John Yezerki at right tackle and colorful Nebb Elduyan at right guard. Six foot four, 238-pound Yezerki starts his second year hailed as an outstanding candidate for All-American honors with the sensational Nebb not far behind.

Here are the newcomers: Felix Penino, 190 pounds and a two year letterman from Los Angeles, at left end; Eddie Erdelatz, guarding the opposite flank, is a 189-pound junior from San Francisco; Herm Meister, 210 pounds of tackle, is also playing at home today; Wag Jorgensen, in the center, is trying to emulate his brother Carl's feat of earning three football sweaters. This year will be his second.

Only newcomer is Jerry Dennerlein at left guard. This broad-shouldered blonde from Los Angeles was the only sophomore strong enough to muscle his way into the regular line. So far he has been sensational and St. Mary's hopes he continues his burning pace today.

Three new men take their places in the Gael backfield as regulars today. Nichelini at right half is commencing his third and last year; Schreiber, left half, and Kellogg, fullback, played enough last season to win letters but Quarterback Fiese played in only two games when injuries laid him low.

The quartet above will probably be in there most of the time today, but "Slip" has a group of sensational reserves that are figured to see plenty of action. Ed Hallman, the fleet sophomore, alternates with Schreiber and when "Big Nick" wearies Floyd Maxham, another versatile first-year man, will carry on. Hugh Sill, an elusive blonde from Bakersfield, or the diminutive Rolly Willett will understudy Fiese, and Chinto Conrotto or Joe Cassidy, two hefty line-smashers, will fill in for Kellogg.

Ambitious Columbia

This is a warning to "Slip" Madigan.

His far-famed Gaels of St. Mary's needn't look for a setup when Columbia's ambitious horde of Cliffmen swarm the close-clipped turf of Kezar this afternoon in their first California crusade, for Columbia is ambitious!

This is the same Columbia that held Oregon, co-champions of the Pacific Coast Conference, even until the last minute of play and then bowed, 7 to 14. It held Gonzaga to a 13 to 8 score. It has scored in 20 consecutive games. It has completed 78 out of 130 passes for an average of 60 per cent in the last two years.

And this year, with the grandest, fightingest club in its history, Columbia is dipping into the big time with games against St. Mary's, Santa Clara, Oregon State and Gonzaga. Much in the same fashion that "Little St. Mary's" sallied forth a few years back to take the football world by storm.

For today's contest, Coach Gene L. Murphy of the Cliffdwellers will field a veteran line in front of a fast, shifty backfield. His backs will throw passes—lots of 'em. You see, Murphy's ball-packers are picked in advance for their hurling ability, and they open each daily practice with a 20-minute tossing session.

The manner in which this man Murphy builds great passing elevens is a revelation. "I'll take a good passer any day," he says,

"in preference to a good open-field runner. The pass is the best weapon a football team has. You're just throwing away opportunities if you rely simply upon a running attack and the punt."

A successful group of passers must have adequate protection from the line, so Murphy never neglects the forward wall. This year a veteran line features two brilliant stars in Pete Leinwebber tackle, and Tony Rogers, watch-charm guard. Leinwebber is an outstanding candidate for all-Coast honors.

Columbia's starting backs against St. Mary's will probably be Manion at quarter, Dungan and Albin at halves and Crawford at fullback. Dungan is the open-field runner and line-slicer, Albin the ace passer, and Crawford the pile-driver. Manion, the commander, is a brilliant strategist and a great defensive star.

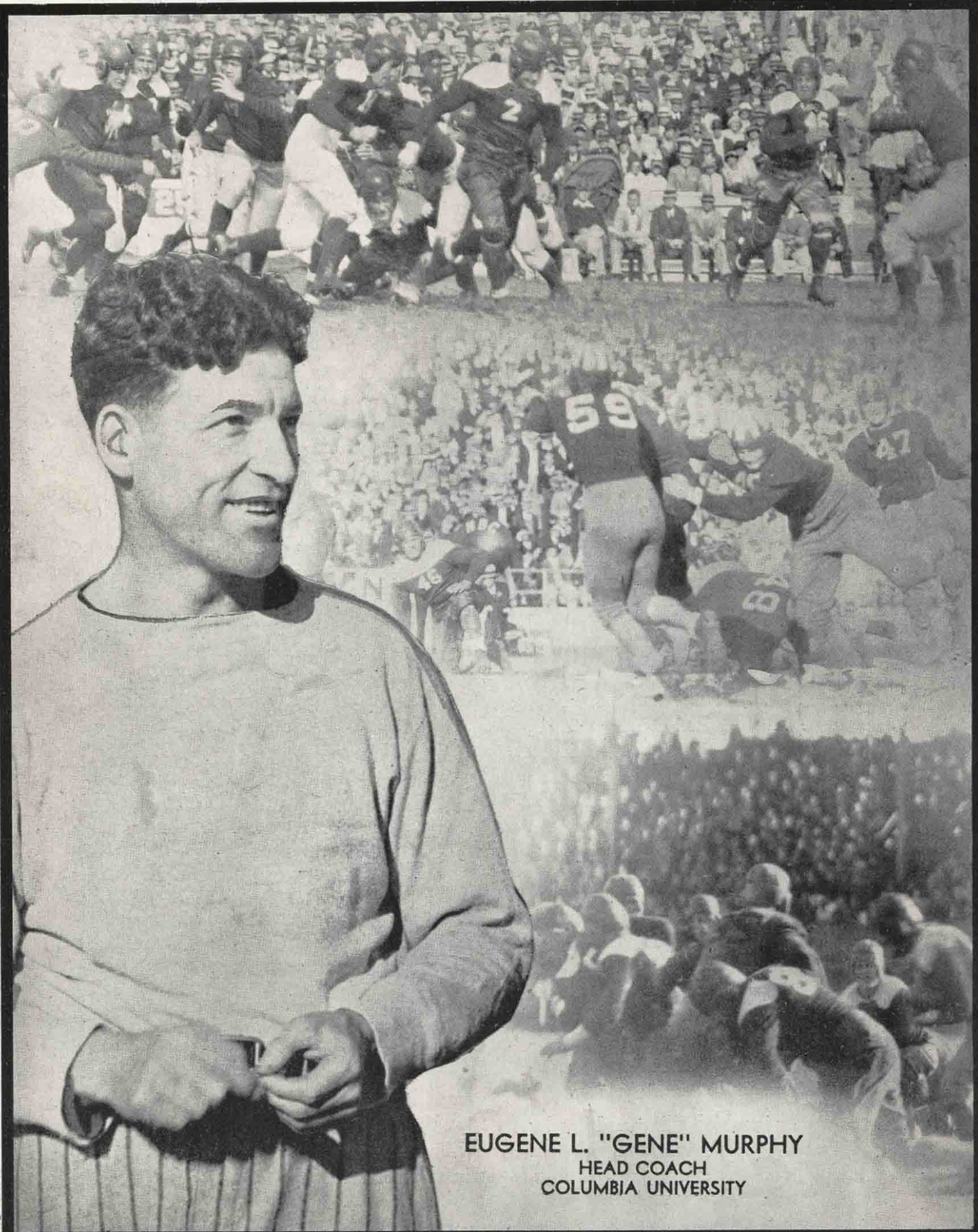
"Straight Notre Dame stuff" — with variations. Such is the variety of football which Columbia University will present today. The variations are important because they've been a major factor in the plan of attack that has enabled Columbia to run up a record of at least one touchdown in each of 20 consecutive games and lose no game by more than eight points in the last five years.

Murphy's variations of the famous Rockne system include a sparkling assortment of "foolers" which he hopes to show against St. Mary's. Murphy, in fact, makes no secret of his intention to use every trick in the bag in an effort to upset the powerful Gaels.

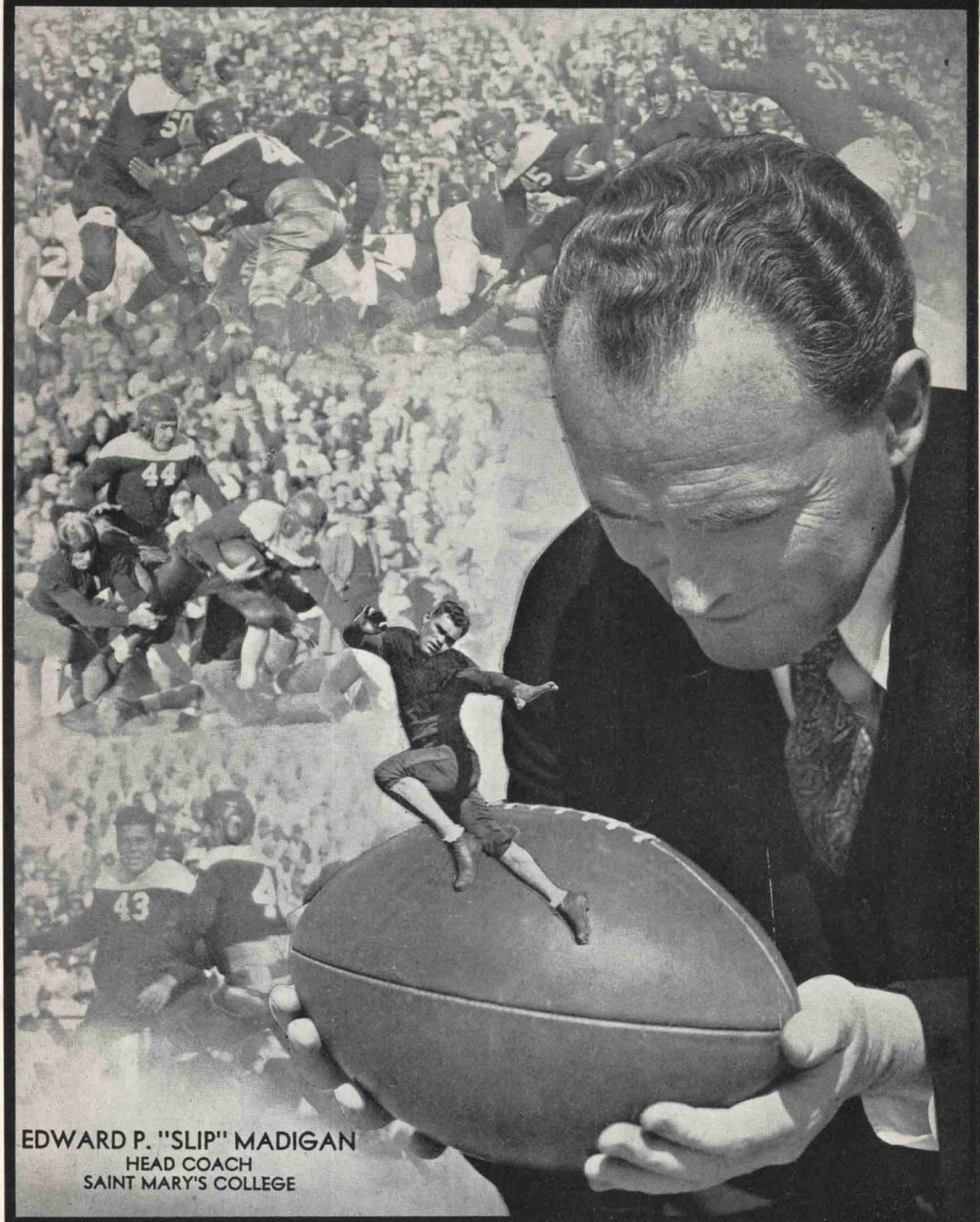

Sport Sparks

The Galloping Gaels are away!

Whether or not it's their glamorous nickname, their colorful coach, or the brand of ball they play no one is sure, but certain it is that they set this old town agog as no other team has ever done. They are past masters at this football business of thrilling and chilling.

Today they launch a campaign that will encompass nine foes before the football sun has set next December. Next Saturday they square off against California's Golden Bears in a renewal of the Nation's greatest early-season grid classic. After that there's a tussle with Nevada and then it's off to New York City and Fordham! Tilts with Washington State, U.C.L.A., Santa Clara, Oregon and U.S.F. conclude the crusade.

Guiding the football destinies of Saint Mary's for his one hundred and twenty-first consecutive game today is Coach Ed "Slip" Madigan, dean of the Far West's football mentors and one of the greatest coaches in the country. Of ninety-six games played since 1924, the Gaels have lost but seventeen and have never been defeated, with one exception, by more than thirteen points. The one exception was by fourteen points against Fordham in 1932.

An attestation of the esteem with which the Nation's football public regard "Slip" was given by the recent poll to select a coach for the All-Stars at the Century of Progress exhibition football game. Fans all over the country were invited to vote for the coach they considered best. Despite the fact that no newspaper in the Bay region published ballots, Madigan

placed fourth with over 400,000 votes, far ahead of any other coach on the Pacific Coast.

At least one member of the St. Mary's team will be playing against a flock of old acquaintances today. John Yezerski, the Gaels' biggest claimant for All-American honors, is a Portland boy and squared off against many of the present crop of Columbia gridders while attending high school in that city. Terrence Harding, 198-pound reserve tackle for the Cliffmen, in fact, was chosen on the All-City team with "Big John" in 1931.

Meet the newest thing in Gaels. Introducing St. Mary's synchronized sophomores: Jerry "Denny" Dennerlein, guard, Southern California's successor to "Bud" Gilbert; Wally Morse, 200-pounds of fullback from the desert wastes of Utah; Floyd "Smacksem" Maxham, who will take up where "Ambling Al" leaves off; Gerry Conlee, the center phenom from Chico; Denny Keran and "Jumping Johnny" Giannoni, a grand pair of tackles; Marty Kordick, a steel-sinewed guard, and "Dazzy Jim" Austin, Movie Colony adonis and a sweet end.

Lest we forget, there's Vic Strub and Les Groux, two East-bay boys; Jack Slatery, Jim Summers and "Oski" Haloski from this side of the Water, as well as Bob Timm of Dixon, Don Miller from Spokane, Dick Ragle from down the Valley, Ned O'Loughlin and Lubo Popovich of the Orange Belt, Louis Ferry from Richmond and "Sad Sam" Miller from nobody knows where.

They are without doubt the finest crop of sophomore prospects since 1931 when

last year's graduates, the Canrinuses, Wilson, Gilbert, Partee, et al, donned the Red and Blue. Under the enlightened tutelage of Vince McNally last Fall they lost only to the strong Antioch Legion, 7-6, and to Santa Clara's undefeated yearlings, 13-7. In the latter game they made sixteen first downs to the Colt's two.

San Francisco's lone contribution to Columbia's team is Tommy Hawkins, 165-pound reserve guard. Tommy, who won All-City honors at Sacred Heart High two years ago, is a brilliant lineman, despite his small stature and Coach Gene Murphy rates him one of his best sophomore prospects.

Not since 1926 has a Saint Mary's team gone into the California game the underdog. That year the Gaels galloped off with a surprise 26 to 7 victory after a certain "Cowboy" Smith had outsprinted the Bear backs all afternoon. Next Saturday Saint Mary's will once again be the short-enders and it's just possible that Al Nichelini or Ed Hallman may pull a "Cowboy" stunt.

Eddie Erdelatz, star end and a leading contender for all-Coast honors, is not confining his talents to the gridiron. He possesses a fine baritone voice and had the pleasure of doing a solo for Cab Calloway last season while visiting the Cotton Club after the Fordham game. Eddie is also a cartoonist of merit and sketches "Hatlos" for the school paper.

Two former classmates and team-mates will be contesting each other from strategic points on opposite benches today. Coaches Gene Murphy and Edward Madi-

gan sat next to each other in class and played together while attending the South Bend's outstanding institution of learning.

Bucky O'Connor, promising Galloper reserve guard, has found an original method of obtaining that leg drive so necessary in bowling over opposing linesmen. The former Lowell High star owns a brilliantly green-colored Ford (pre-war vintage) whose sporadic feats of "stop and go" provide him with ample opportunity for pushing it over the somewhat hilly Moraga terrain.

U.S.C. grid huskies haven't the entire monopoly on the summer movie jobs. St. Mary's Nebb Elduayan, familiarly known to campus cronies as "Hollywood On The Air," has disported himself with a conscious verve on some of the better picture lots for the past two summer recesses.

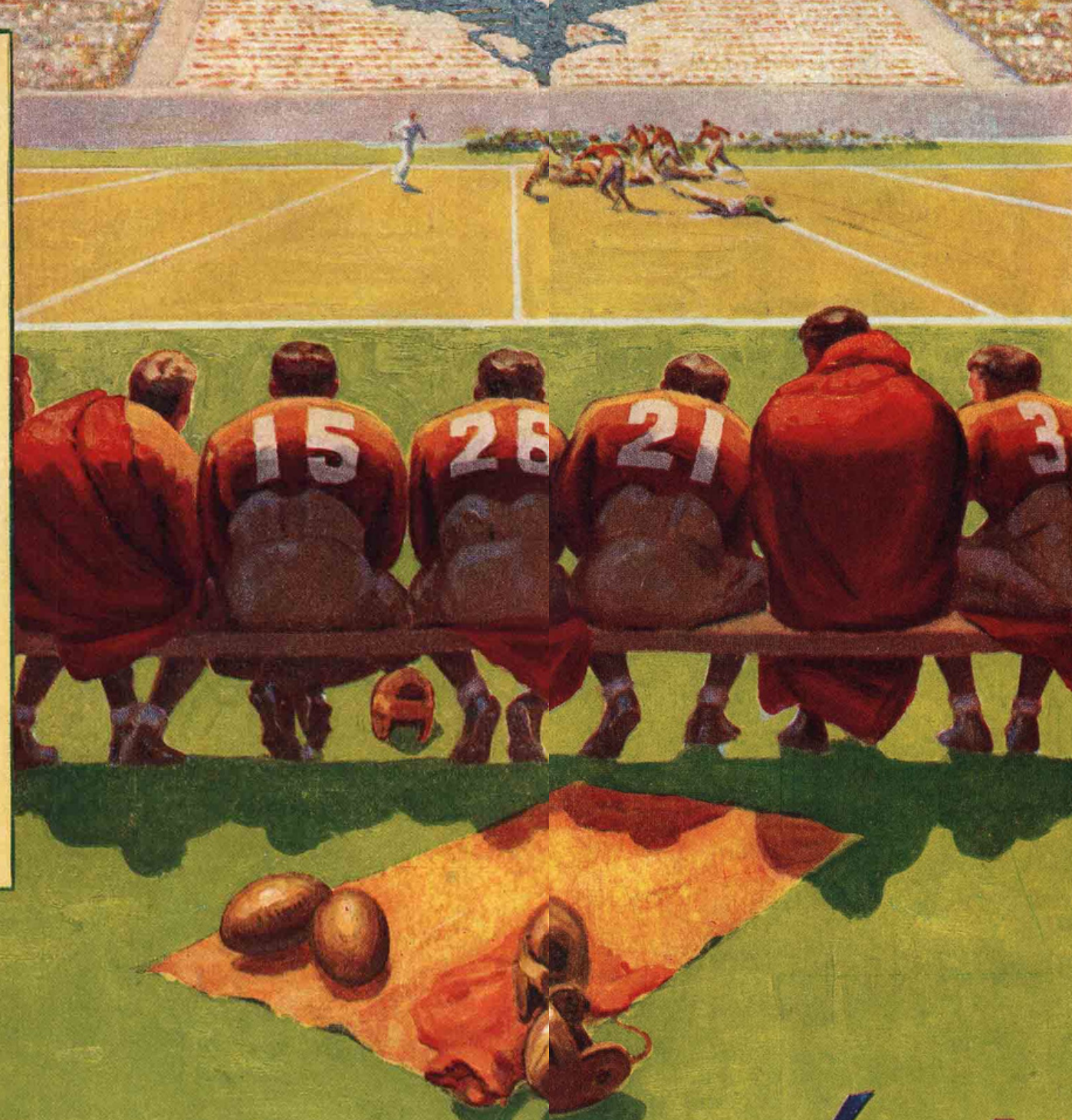
Captaining the Gaels in their inaugural today will be Felix Pennino, sturdy flankman from Los Angeles. Pennino, a grand end in his own right, had the misfortune to enter St. Mary's a year after Fred Canrinus and of necessity understudied Fred for two years, winning letters in each. Coming into his own at last, Felix is expected to be a tower of strength and confidence to the newcomers in the line. Slip maintains that he is one of the greatest defensive players he ever coached and precious few yards are ever gained around him. The little town of Trinidad, Colorado, where he was born and raised, yearly declares a holiday when the Gaels pass through on their way to Fordham, and the populace turns out en masse to compliment another "local boy who made good."

California has its stars. But no stars that can cope with Ambling Al. He is relied upon to register the margin needed for the all important victory.

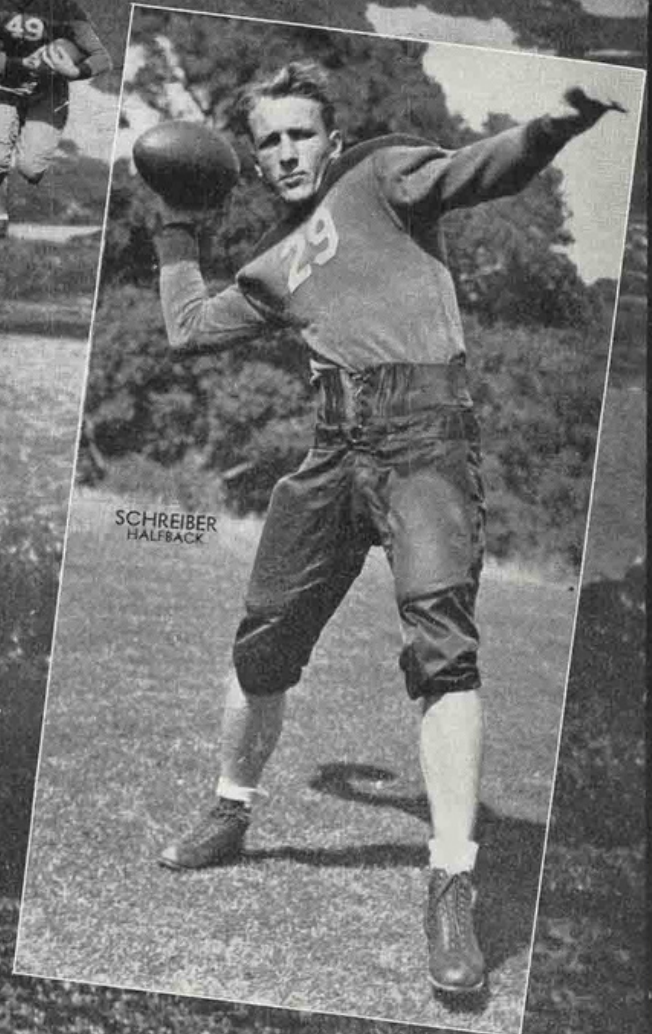
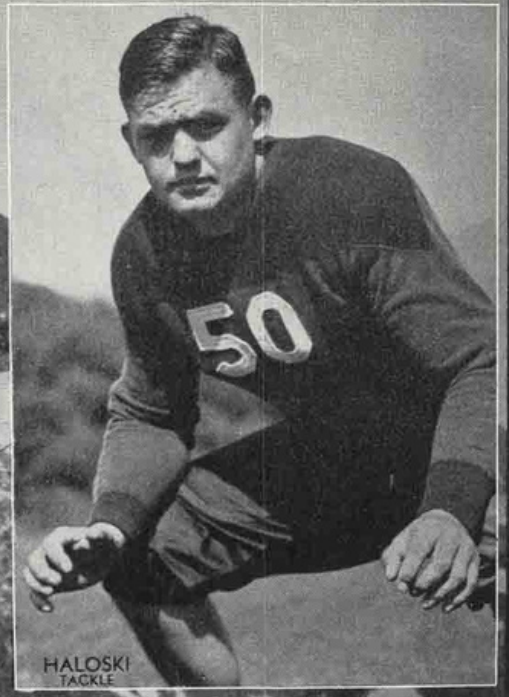
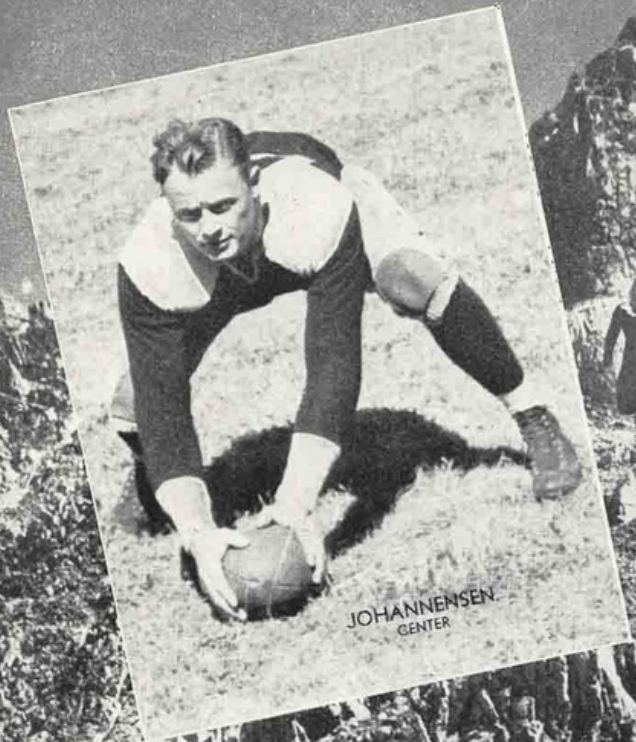

The great day! The great game! The great Nichelini!

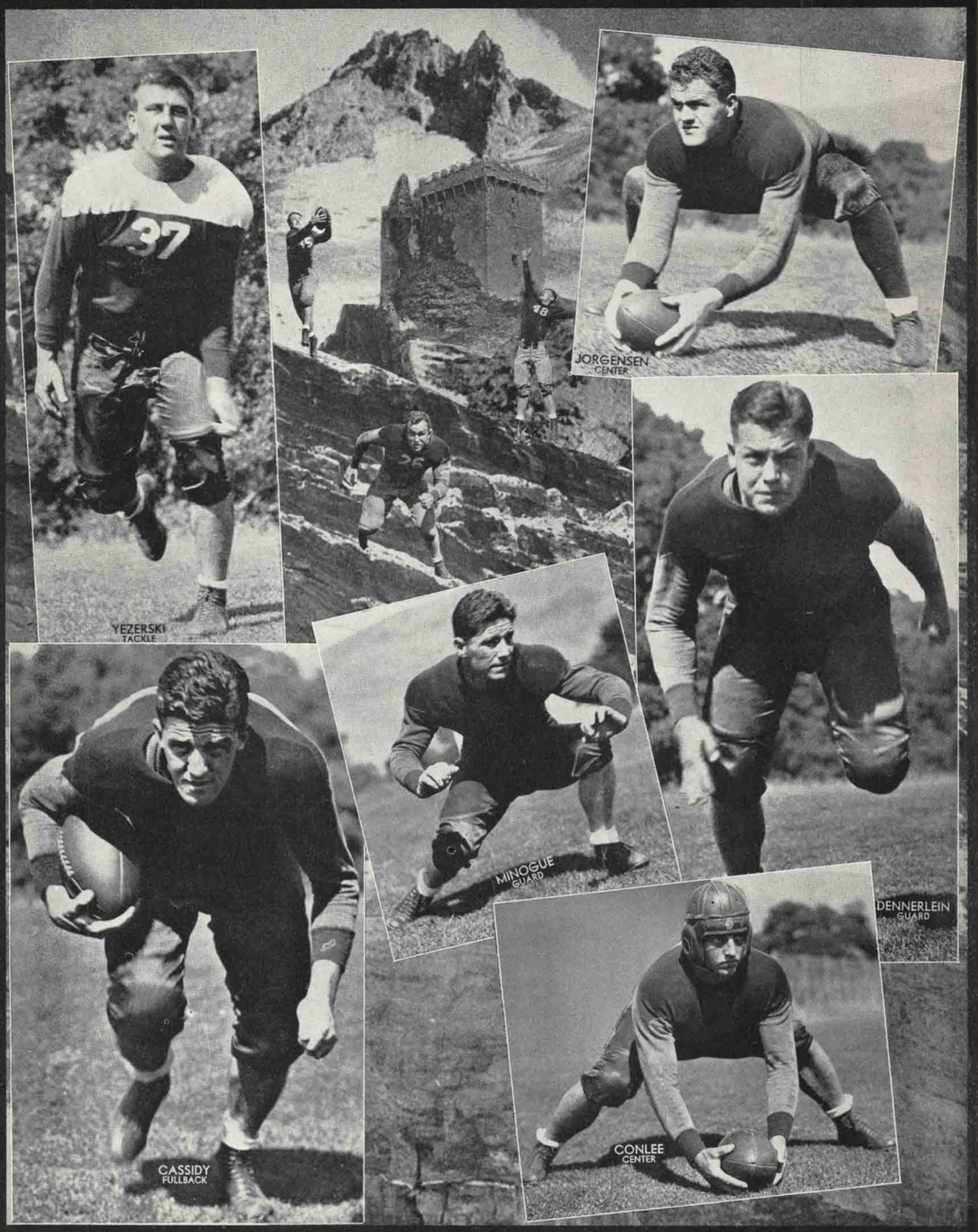
