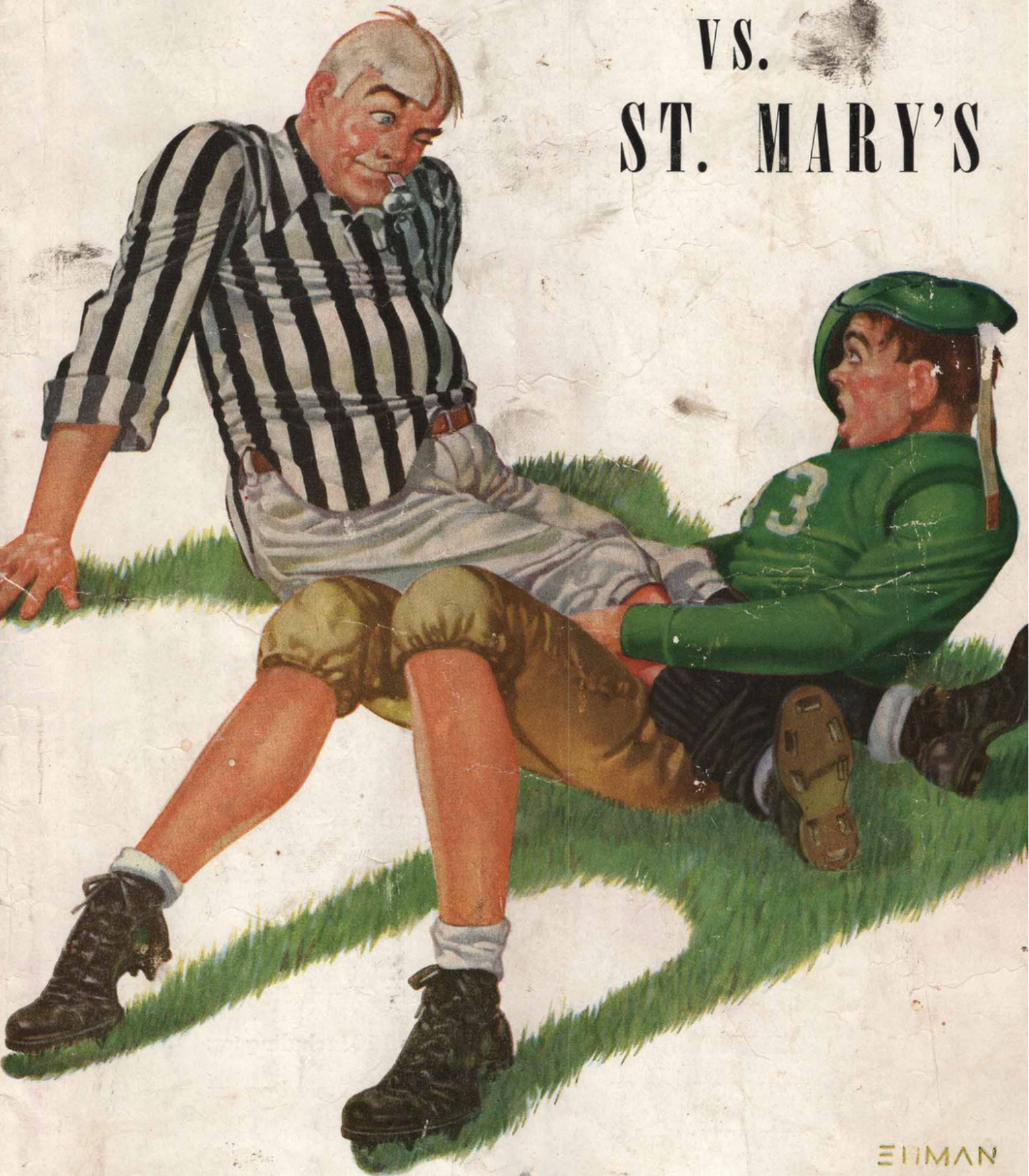

The BRONCOS vs. the GAELS

For the first time since 1935 the Galloping Gaels of St. Mary's College are favored to defeat the Broncos of Santa Clara in the "Little Big Game," the most colorful gridiron spectacle in the West, this afternoon.

Slip Madigan's Gaels are flitting after a national championship this year, after a glory famine which has endured at the Moraga campus since 1933, while the Broncos, after three years on top of the heap, have met the inevitable reaction which is as truly a law of football as it is a law of physics.

Last week "Buck" Shaw's boys showed flashes of brilliance, although they got only a 13-13 tie from a weaker U.S.F. team. Over 300 yards in passing and running by the Broncos was nullified by inspired Don defense and the flashing legs of Sammy Johnstone and Pete Franceschi. Today Santa Clara has not the breakaway stars like Franceschi and Johnstone to cope with, but a powerful running attack borne by two hard-running backs, Herb Smith, fullback, and Ed Heffernan, left half, with the added burden of a darting passing attack, founded on Heffernan's passing arm.

Santa Clara offers in return a comparable aerial offense an attack which has given Santa Clara every touchdown it has tallied in its last five games. Two perfect passes, Johnson to Sanders, and Casanega to Roche, drew the Broncos up into a tie against George Malley's boys when their ground offense proved inadequate.

The Santa Clara ground attack, based on deception and concentrated power, has shown improved effectiveness as the season has progressed, but that extra-push inside the enemy 20-yard marker which separates greatness from mediocrity has been lacking in the Shavian team's makeup.

Six marches down the field, against Utah, Texas A. & M., and San Francisco, looked unstoppable in midfield, but each bogged down when the shadow of the goal posts fell across the backs of the defending linemen.

One of the chances Santa Clara has to give the lie to the 2-1 odds prevailing against them is to make that potentially-great running attack go all the way.

The Gaels, although they suffered the loss of two All-American candidates in Mike Klotovich and George Cantwell, have conquered adversity to the extent of walloping Gonzaga, 19-0, and turning back an inspired California team, 7-3.

The scheduled St. Mary's-Loyola game last week was postponed because of an infantile paralysis epidemic among Loyola players.

Slip Madigan has on his Moraga campus probably the best forward wall of any team on the West Coast. Ken Hardy, for two years a reserve center, found himself in the California fracas, and he now ranks as one of the better centers in the Bay Region.

St. Mary's has four superior guards to chose from, with Tony Lucas and Dick Mesak probably getting the starting call oved Vic Martinelli and Ray Ruddell.

The tackle situation is, if possible, even stronger than the happy condition at guard. Dick Jones and Nick Katzmeyer are veterans, proven as fine players in their own right, and there are three sophomore giants who stood up nobly under fire at Berkeley, Nick Seminoff, Al Ward, and Owen Henson.

Jack Crampton, Lavine Bettencourt, Ivan Pivaroff, and Bob Brusatti make the Gaels rival any team in the country in wing strength.

Jack Guthrie was just a good quarterback, who could spell Mike Perrie for a while last year, but in two games this fall he has shown a football wisdom and blocking power unsuspected in the stocky, towhead two months ago.

Ed Heffernan is Madigan's choice for the best all-around back on the Coast. The baby-faced Bakersfield lad is a good runner, and, as all grid followers know, a fine passer. Jack Sims, another towhead, is the starting right halfback, and does the punting for the Gaels.

Whitey Smith, the best line plunger in the Coast's fullbacking business, is the spearhead of the Moragan's offense. It was his driving legs which moved the ball across the Bear goal line for the winning touchdown.

Santa Clara, off early season performances, offers a line weaker both defensively and offensively than the Gaels', and a backfield about equal to Assistant Coach Strader's product.

With each succeeding week Johnny Schiechl cinches more firmly his right to All-American honors. Watch his almost-psychic ability to divine the direction of the offensive play as it starts.

Frank Hagan and Ves O'Connor will start at guards for the Broncs, Nick Stubler and Bill Toomey, out since the Texas game, at tackles, and Bill Anahu, who had his worst day in years against the Dons, and Johnny Thom, at ends.

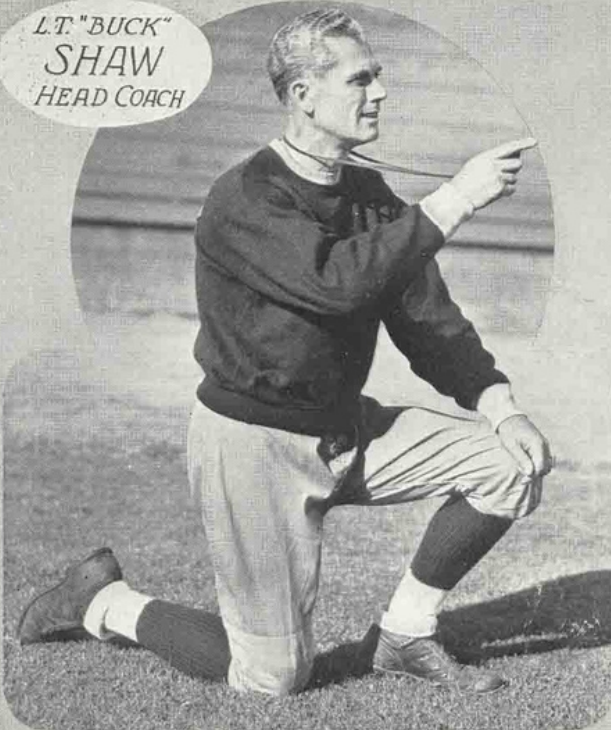
Ray McCarthy, redheaded Irish lad will mastermind at quarterback, Jim Johnson, Santa Clara's choice for the "most valuable back" honors, will go, as usual, at left half, and Ward Heiser enters the lineup for the first time since the Utah game at right half. He is expected to give that extra "oomph" to the Bronco weak side attack. Jack Roche, senior from Redwood City, will match power and speed with Smith at fullback.

An encouraging notice to emanate from the Mission campus is Coach "Buck" Shaw's announcement that his inexperienced sophomores stood up nobly last week, and he may use them as a unit today. Considering the weak showing of these same lads three weeks ago, their performance in storming down the field in the fourth quarter against the Dons, means that the Santa Clara reserve problem is at least partially solved.

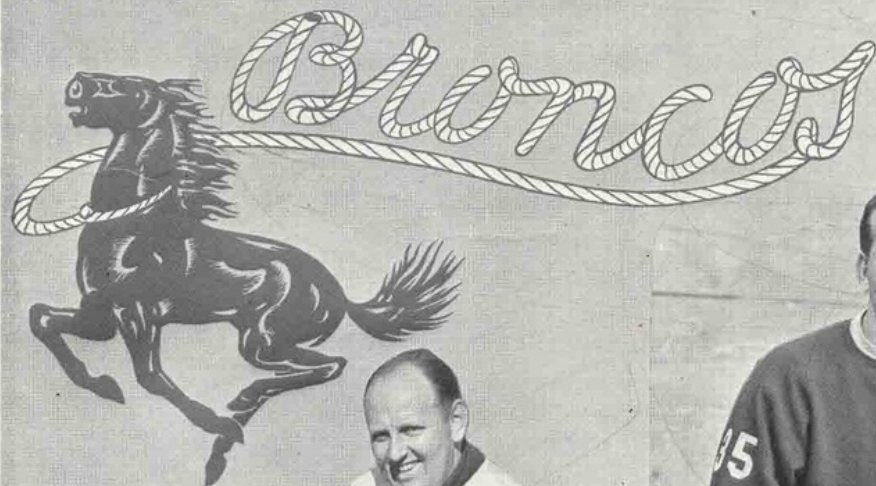
It would be platitudinous to announce that this will be a bitterly fought, give-and-take battle. The record of past Gael-Bronc games amply expresses this truth. The Gaels are overwhelming favorites, for the first time in years, but the uncertainty in pre-game odds can be seen in the 1938 game when the Broncs had almost an equal ascendancy and were upset.

The lowliest sub may be a superman this evening and the All-American may be "that bum", but, win, lose or draw, 60,000 people will have seen the greatest game of the season when the Gaels and the Broncs finish squaring off this afternoon.

Holding. (Penalty—by offense, 15 yards; by defense, 5 yards.)



Delay of game or extra time-outs. (Penalty, 5 yards.)



Player illegally in motion. (Penalty, 5 yards. If from shift or huddle, 15 yards.)

Crawling, pushing, or helping ball-carrier. (Penalty for helping ball-carrier, 15 yards; otherwise, 5 yards.)



Interference with forward pass, or pass touching ineligible player. (Penalty, if interference by offense, 15 yards; otherwise, ball goes to opponents at point of foul.) In case pass touches ineligible receiver, ball goes to opponents at spot of preceding down.



Penalty refused, incomplete pass, missed field goal or conversion, both sides off-side, etc.



Illegal forward pass.

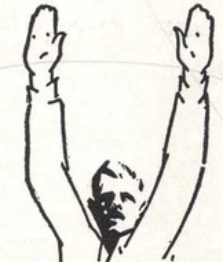
Unnecessary roughness, illegal defensive use of the hands. (Penalty, 15 yards.)

Military salute also used for clipping, followed by striking the back of the knee with hand. (Penalty, 15 yards.)

Signal also used for disqualification fouls and for running into or roughing the kicker. In the latter case, the military salute is followed by swinging the leg as though punting.

Offside and violation of kick-off formation. (Penalty, 5 yards.)

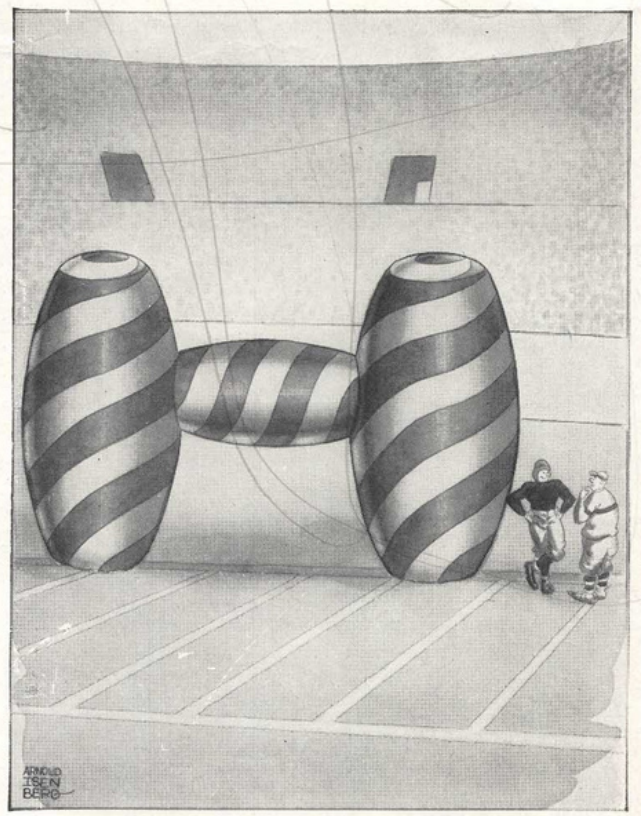
