Amos Alonzo Stagg has a team that can make it tough for any and all opposition. The U. S. C. Trojans were the inferior team for three quarters last Saturday in their melee with the Pacific Tigers. Then passes changed the tide of victory to splash towards Troy.

The Gaels are a team of uncertainty. Their capabilities are still resting in a potential state. Sports writers and pseudo-prognosticators are kept guessing along with the rest of us. Yep, the 1935 Galloping Gaels are on a See-Saw.

Up one week and down the next. That's the way those huskies from Moraga have been on the See-Saw. Of course, their change in position was somewhat controlled from the other end of the teeter. Both ends of the See-Saw can't remain aloft.

But what makes everything so strange is that Saint Mary's has some of the best see-sawers in the game. After all their practice, the Merry Moragans teetered and tottered like little children as they faced the big Bear on the other end.

Maybe it is apropos that the Gaels will see-saw with Pacifiers from Stockton today.

Madigan has a difficult time adjusting his lads on the up-and-down board. Perhaps he will have found the right combination by now. There is just space enough for eleven men, four of them in the back and seven in front.

In Mr. Madigan's teeter-totter sessions each afternoon some new aspirants have been replacing the veterans. Some of the newcomers are elated at having a chance to test splinters from another source.

On the rear seats are Herb Schreiber, the work-horse of the crew, and Les Groux, the recent triple-threat find . . . they are the halfbacks. Floyd Maxham holds down the third seat because he handles himself so well. Wally Morse completes the quartet. An agile two hundred pounder who can keep the team hustling as well as call the right plays—that's Wally.

A number of the old-timers occupy most of the front seats. Wag Jorgensen is in the very center. On one side is Marty Kordick, and on the other is Bucky O'Connor who sneaked in to take Gerry Conlee's place. Herm Meister will be one of the tackles and big Bill Wilkin will take the other unless Dennerlein is able to convince Mr. Madigan he has recovered from a leg injury. Ed Erdelatz and Ev Pendleton will be at the flanks.

Then again at the last minute the Gael Mentor might push some of the boys off the teeter and put some others on. You never can tell when some new see-sawer will pop up; and Mr. Madigan has been keeping his eyes open for just that.

We dislike seeing Mr. Madigan in a dubious state of mind. It's no easy task to find the eleven best constituents for an A-1 unit. And that unit must be well organized to be effective. And in turn effectiveness is not brought about immediately. Mr. Madigan has had less than a week in which to concoct his winning mixture.

Injuries also had to be contended with. Fiese, Dennerlein, Conlee—all will be missing at the opening kickoff this afternoon.





It was the super-splendid passing of Tom Wilson that gave the Gaels so much trouble in '33. Pacific no longer has Wilson, but Stagg maintains that halfback Bob Coe is a topnotch flinger. Fred Straube, a triplethreater, can also toss 'em.

Chatter from thousands of kids will resound in our Kezar Stadium today. It's the annual "dime day." The previous two years found Nevada as the Gael opponent on the Kiddie Day program. Bay region orphanages are always the guests of Saint Mary's at these occasions.







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# MEET THE TIGER

It has been two years since Amos Alonzo Stagg, Dean of American football and "grand old man" of the Chicago Midway, quit his position as a ranking power of the Big Ten and cast his lot with the grid aspirations of an obscure Western college at Stockton -two years that have witnessed the skyrocketing of the Bengal Tigers of the College of the Pacific to a definite and lasting place among the luminaries of the Coast football firmament.

Two years have passed, also, since the Gaels and the Tigers stood embattled on the turf of Baxter Stadium at Stockton, fighting a glorious game that was scheduled as a "breather" for the Moragans, but which turned into a thrilling spectacle of gridiron strategy as the Bengals brought into play all the tricks Stagg had taught them to beat back the invaders from their goal, finally to succumb to the power of the Madigan force by a scant 3-0 score.

That battle was a baptism of fire for the Staggmen, and they emerged scathed but confident that they had found a coach and a leader who would guide their destinies to greater heights than they had ever imagined.

The magic name of Stagg thrilled California as it had been thrilling the Middle West for over forty years. Contemporaries honored him, prep grid stars rallied to the Pacific colors to learn to fight in the football wars under the old maestro, and major Coast teams invited his competition, knowing that he would deal them blow for blow and match their skill with all the foxiness that he had stowed away in his bag of football tricks through the years. His reputation for sportsmanship and clean fighting has been burnished to even greater lustre by the small but splendid teams he has hurled against his foes in the West.

In 1934 the Bengals opened their season against the Trojans at Los Angeles, and stunned the grid world by holding the powerful men of Troy to an unimpressive 6-0 victory. The work that Stagg and Laurie Apitz, his assistant who came West from Chicago with him, had done showed in the fighting Tiger line that stopped the Trojan charges cold and spilled fleet "Cotton" Warburton behind the line of scrimmage so many times that he was removed from the game. Great Pacific names stood out that day—Kjeldsen, mighty guard, who was named for All-American honors; Truckell, "the greatest end who ever stuck his cleats in the turf of the Coliseum"; Corson, center, and Cechini, the "iron-man" tackle; Jim Bainbridge, sparkplug of the dazzling Bengal aerial and flanker formations that bewildered the Trojans and fans alike.

Many thought that game was a fluke, but the Tigers came back the next week to battle the California Bears to a 7-6 standstill at Berkeley, and the "grand old man's" boys from Stockton were definitely established as suitable opponents for the best teams California had to offer. Before the season was out the Bengals had clawed their way to a decisive win over the University of Nevada, after the Wolfpack had upset the dope and the Gaels on the eve of the Fordham trip.

Starting the current season, Coaches Stagg and Apitz were faced by a shortage of manpower, with a squad of but 35 men reporting for practice, of which nearly half were green, untried sophomores. In the forward-wall, depleted by graduation, the Tiger mentor had only three lettermen to form the nucleus of the fast, hard-hitting line that is necessary to pave the way for Pacific's passing and "peedinger" attacks: John "Sixty-minute" Cechini, tackle; Lester "Daddy" Russell, center; and Elliott "Bud" Savage, end. Over this framework, Line-coach Apitz has built a new wall of heavily-upholstered sophomores and third-year men who are playing their first major games this year. The new line has plenty of beef (Bonnifield, 215; Barrett, 229; Campbell, 236), but inexperience took its toll last Saturday at Los Angeles when the wall gave way after three quarters of heavy battering from the Trojan backs. With one hard skirmish under their belts the Tiger linemen are primed to give a better accounting of themselves today.

Additional weight in the backfield has enabled Pacific to add the threat of power to the tricky formations that distinguished them last season. Phil Martinovich, sophomore fullback, passes, punts and packs the ball with the greatest of ease, despite his 209 pounds, along with Blanchard and Lapin, who are veterans in the business of hitting the line from the full spot. Jim Bainbridge is playing his last season at quarter after three years of signal-calling for the Staggmen, and he is rated as one of the headiest field generals on the Coast. At the halfback positions watch for Coe and Thompson, the boys who played havoc with the Trojan defense with their passing combinations.

Considered from any angle, when Madigan and Stagg, two of the greatest names in American football. pit the products of their art in combat, things are bound to happen. Coach Stagg concedes the Gaels a slight edge on the basis of experience and reserve power, but whatever happens, today marks the return engagement of two clean, hard-fighting teams in an exhibition of real football. In the boxer's parlance, "May the best team win."
