Tents erected to open 200 additional beds on campus

In response to the increase of students and the predicted lack of housing available for the 1998-99 school year, the Administration has proposed the construction of 50 temporary tent cabins to be located on the football practice field behind McKeon Gym.

The cabins, similar to those found in Camp Curry at Yosemite, will provide housing to an additional 200

students left homeless from the ill-fated housing lottery, until the completion of Ageno D and E.

Salvaged from the Pre-Naval Flight school that was based at St. Mary's from 1942-1946, the tents consist of a wooden frame, a wooden floor, and a waterproof tarp. The tents will accommodate four cots, four footlockers, and a large, closet sized cabinet to be shared by the resi-

Electricity will be wired into each tent, and small space heaters will be furnished. Furthermore, mobile restroom facilities will be set up throughout the area, including hot water Please see TENTS, page 2

Lifted to the Heavens

St. La Salle statue levitates 3 feet above its pedestal

The Saint John Baptist De La Salle statue has been a topic of much discussion since it was placed in the Chapel Plaza. However, complaints regarding its size have been overshadowed by a new turn of events.

De La Salle has taken what some describe as a more "active" role on campus since the commencement of Spring Term.

This symbol of the Christian Brothers' tradition on which the College was founded, has recently levitated above its pedestal, reaching a height of approximately 3 feet.

One of the first sightings took place on Thursday, February 26 at 4:00am. It was witnessed by an astronomy student, who described what she saw as "even more aweinspiring than the brightest star in the heavens."

Ajunior stated, "The statue

was a good 3 feet off his stand, just floating there in mid-air."

Due to heightened concern, several explanations have been offered by faculty, staff, and students of the College.

The Physics department, in conjunction with the Biology and Chemistry departments, has initiated a series of tests on the statue's molecular structure.

The results have not been verified. but some documented observa-

tions have been made. According to a report released by the School of Science, important changes in the statue's molecular composition suggest that the bronze from which it is sculpted is decaying at an accelerated

It is believed that this could

possibly be due to over-polishing with an experimental polish created by several unidentified freshman Chemistry students.

The report hypothesized that this altering of structure at the molecular level has in turned changed the polariza-

KSMC World Domination Plot Foiled

Cult leader James Gosnell arrested following FBI confrontation

The idyllic St. Mary's campus, located in the green hills of Moraga, was catapulted into national news last week.

Under the leadership of the strangely charismatic James Gosnell, the staff of KSMC, the College radio station, engaged in a Waco-esque standoff with the Moraga police department and agents from federal agencies such as the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, the FBI and the FCC.

This standoff occurred when police and federal agents, investigating the

staff's plans for world domination, demanded entry to the radio station located in Ferroggiaro Hall in order to assess whether or not the staff was stockpiling weapons.

In reply, the staff members barricaded the doors and windows, refusing entry to all. They issued an on-air state-

claring that safety. they had been hoarding food supplies and "Snapple" some and they had indeed been stockpiling weapons—as well as CDs-in preparation o for just such a standoff.

As of Monday, March 30, St. Mary's College will replace Stanford University as the educational choice of the First Daughter. Chelsea Clinton, currently a freshman at Stanford, has chosen to attend St. Mary's as an escape from the pressures she has faced at the Ivy League school.

Having toured St. Mary's numerous times over the year, Chelsea chose the school after a personal luncheon with President Bro. Craig Franz, FSC, Ph.D.

"I really like the atmosphere and the unity here," said the First Daughter. Present at the march held on March 10, Chelsea stated how she was eager to attend a school where the attention was directed toward a president other than her father.

Coming as a Pre-med major from Stanford, Chelsea was drawn to St. Mary's for its unique Integral Program. Having attended a dinner reception in her honor that was \$150 per plate, Chelsea had the opportunity to meet with professors of all departments

She also attended a special mass with the Brothers, along with her parents, President Bill Clinton and First Lady Hilary Clinton, who both fully support her decision to transfer.

"I am extremely supportive of Chelsea's choice. I think this college has a lot to offer her that she's been deprived of at other schools, education-

Similar to her lifestyle at Stanford, Chelsea will be accompanied by her usual parade of Secret Service. Furthermore, the presence of the Secret Service will provide additional assistance to Public Safety as President Clinton requires a man stationed at the gate at all hours, in addition to the present Public Safety officers.

KSMC: Radio station standoff turns hostile

Continued from page 1 and roped off, as KSMC staff members seemed inclined to hurl unpopular CDs out of the window, frisbee-style.

One federal agent, attemptng to keep spectators out of the quad, was injured by a flying CD and was barely restrained from firing on the radio station.

The College's Public Relations office was thrown into chaos as reporters swarmed its doors, and it attempted to dismiss the standoff as some sort of media social.

President Bro. Craig Franz, FSC, Ph.D. and Vice Presi-

dent for Student Affairs Bro. Jack Curran, Ph.D. were unavailable for comment, as they had gone out of town for several days.

The standoff came to a close when the FCC dismantled the station transmitter located on the ground floor of Augustine Hall. Gosnell was apprehended when he attempted to investigate the broadcast signal loss. He was escorted off campus by federal officials and will be arraigned in court on Friday.

Deprived of their leader, the KSMC staff soon surrendered to federal officials.

The majority of St. Mary's students, however, have not been satisfied by the explanations offered. In response, the College's spiritual authority, Director of Campus Ministry Fr. However, at this point no definitive decisions regarding the cause of the statue's levitation have been determined.

The sculpted bronze figure of Saint John Baptist De La Salle continues to hover.

Students Initiate Commune Plan

On Saturday, March 21, led by the Men's Basketball team, students gathered in Ferroggario Quad and held a meeting. The group discussed the direction they needed to take in order to maintain the peaceful atmosphere on campus.

With a united front, the students presented their proposal to the President of the College. The proposal called for a complete change in the system of St. Mary's College, including a title change.

The student proposal requested that St. Mary's Col- Plaza and the Chapel Lawn.

lege be changed to St. Mary's Commune--this way the school's acronym could remain. The proposal also detailed a plan for the College to turn to itself for all needed resources. The commune plan included an extensive economic system on which the school could subsist.

Under the students' plan, the football field would become the main source of food. The plan called for an immediate move to plant the field with the necessary organic foods. Each student would be responsible for a small plot of land.

In order to bring all students to campus, the student plan requested not only the Franz Field tent housing, but also to build tent cabins in Poplar Grove, Garaventa

A change in curriculum was also proposed. Students advocated the move away from traditional education to a more liberal education. The new curriculum would provide classes in the environment, 1970s philosophy, radical literature, basket weaving and bead making.

The proposal also asked that Wednesdays be set aside for Community Day. Each Wednesday students intended to gather in the Friendship Circle Ferroggario Quad for peace, love and music. Each person enrolled in the campus guitar course would be offered a chance to become a song leader.
