Three Elected to Exec. Team

Daniel, Hamer, and Uyematsu elected to lead the ASSMC next year

After a spirited campaign, the ASSMC Election Committee announced the results of the Executive Elections.

In the race for ASSMC President, Kiersten Daniel defeated Hugo Torres with 50.7% of the 505 votes cast in the race. Torres received 45.5% of the vote, with the remaining votes being won by write-in candidates.

The contest was extremely close, with Daniel winning just three votes more than required by the Constitution (simple majority plus one) to win the election outright. In the raw count, Daniel won 256 votes, while a simple majority in the race is constituted by 253 votes. Torres took 230 votes.

In the race for Vice President of

ASSMC Voting process and Election Committee decision in question

The official end of the ASSMC Executive elections has not brought an end to the controversy surrounding the March contest. Most of the debate about the previous election has centered around two areas: the disqualification of Brad Kvederis and the voting procedures used to conduct the elec-

debate surrounding Kvederis' candidacy began when he submitted a petition for the position of ASSMC Vice President of Administration. He asserts he circled the wrong position (Administration), but decided to run for Vice President of Administration position after the ASSMC told him the petition would only be valid for that position. "I wanted to run for Vice President of Student Affairs, but they told me that because I circled Vice President of Administration, I couldn't change," said Kvederis.

The campaign began on Monday, March 13, and the Election Committee disqualified Kvederis the following day, March 14, for violation of election rules. According to current Vice President of Administration Theresa Fullmer, Please see "RULING," page 7

Father Sal Ragusa, Director of Campus Ministry, will leave Saint Mary's to assume the position of Moderator of the Western Region for the Salvatorian religious community, effective June 1.

Students Help Public Safety Crack Down

While campus Public Safety logs show a graduated increase of student crimes on campus, there is also an increase of student action being taken to help curb campus problems. According to Saint Mary's Director of Public Safety, Roger Sciutto, even though crimes involving stolen property and

drugs are on a perplexing rise, many Saint Mary's students have stepped forward to help Public Safety officers put an end to criminal activity.

A former narcotics officer and California Narcotics Officer's Association [CNOA] member, Sciutto says that students have come to him involving campus drug problems. "I get students who come to me and are worried about their roommates, worried about what they're doing with their lives. They're not telling me to get their roommates in trouble. They're letting us know so we can stop these kids before they ruin their lives."

Public Safety receives crucial tips involving campus problems from various sources. "I get my information from several sources: from students and from Resident Directors, who tell me some situations that are going on on-campus. We also get our information from the Moraga Police Department, Contra Costa County Sheriff's Department, and the CNOA, who gave me some information on one student who was buying drugs in San Francisco and coming here to deal. You can't expect to come here and deal drugs - that's not fair to the students who are actually ruining their lives using them. It's not fair for us to turn our backs on them. Some students don't want to do anything about it now because they just want to party and they think that nothing should get in the way of their partying, but I have yet to find, as a policeman or a narcotics officer, someone who has had drugs do them any good."

Sciutto prioritizes Saint Mary's students' safety: "The biggest responsibility here is the students. It's their home, their campus, their place. Sciutto re-

A Call For Election Reform

Another election has come and gone...but not without controversy. From the moment the candidates signed up to run for office, this election seemed more a comedy of errors than an exercise in democratic rights. Confusion reigned supreme as election decisions were reversed, identification cards were left unchecked, voting days were abruptly canceled, rules were broken by candidates, an official list of students was not used, candidates were dismissed, and an election for an entire position was moved onto a different ballot.

These actions invalidate an election, no matter for what reason they were taken. Because identification cards were not checked, non-students could have voted and people could have claimed to be anyone they wanted. Throw in the fact that there was no master list of students for voting marshals to check names against, and one person could have voted numerous times using any name they wanted. Perhaps "One person, one vote," should be replaced by "Vote early, vote often," at Saint Mary's. And so, the cumulative effect of these events for the student body constitutes nothing less than a corruption of the democratic processes at the root of any election.

The ASSMC identity crisis is only compounded by the events of this election. Redress these failings. Let this election serve as a clarion call for re-

Procedure. Require identification to vote. Check names against a master list. Initiate a mandatory training session for all voting marshals. Limit the number of people who work at the tables over the course of the election.

Information. Pass out detailed information to the candidates at a compulsory meeting. Provide updates to the student body as to why decisions are made.

Reform. Approve a by-laws addendum to meticulously address every election issue. Rethink the focus of what the election should be.

"The Party Poem"





Addressing the Pope's Apology



"This liturgy, by recalling the sins committed, concretizes the request for forgiveness and opens the way to a commitment made not only before God but also before men; it inaugurates a journey of conversion and change vis-à-vis the past.... Confessing the historical sins of Christianity is not aimed solely at the purification of memory: it is also meant to be an occasion for a change of mentality and certain attitudes in the Church, as well as the source of a new teaching for the future, in the consciousness that the sins of the past remain as temptations in the present."

- Pope John Paul II

-Sins committed in the service of truth (Inquisition)

-Sins committed against the people of Israel (Holocaust)

-Sins committed in actions against love, peace, the rights of peoples, and respect for cultures and religions

-Sins committed against the dignity of women and the unity of the human race

Sunday, March 12 showed signs of a new spirit for the Catholic Church when Pope John Paul II addressed the world at the Vatican on the First Sunday of the Church's Lenten Season. On this official Day of Pardon, Pope John Paul II recognized the Catholic Church in its 2000th year, and addressed the world in forgiveness, repent, and remembrance of the history behind the Church. In the Vatican's public address it was noted: "The Church cannot cross the threshold of the new millennium without encouraging her children to purify themselves through repentance of past errors and instances of infidelity, inconsistency, and slowness to act..." The special Mass signaled a pivotal moment in the jubilee year for the Catholic Faith.

Surrounded by the public, Pope John Paul II, joined by five Vatican cardinals and two bishops, sought God's forgiveness for the Church in years past and present, while maintaining the glory of God's presence throughout the Church's history. Living out messages from the bible, The Pope asked for forgiveness for the sins committed within the Church, by church members and

leaders: "I ask that in this year of mercy the Church, strong in the holiness which she receives from her Lord, should kneel before God and implore forgiveness for the past and present sins of her sons and daughters. 'All have sinned, and none can claim righteousness before God.' (Kings 8:46) Christians are invited to acknowledge, before God and before those offended by their actions, the faults which they have committed. Let them do so without seeking anything in return, but strengthened only by the 'love of God which has been poured into our hearts' (Romans 5:5)."

The Pope's apology, as witnessed by the public, has been met with some concern from doubtful leaders. Many global leaders felt the plea for forgiveness from God did not adequately specify historical incidents that the Church participated in, or ignored. For instance, Israel's chief rabbi, Meir Lau described himself as being "deeply frustrated" by the Pope's failure to specifically mention the Holocaust by name. However, Lau did comment that he appreciated the Pope's commitment towards condemning anti-Semitism, but hoped for more, nonetheless.

In its public press release, the Vatican stated its reason for leaving out specified details or incidents for

which it apologized. "The reference to errors and sins in a liturgy must be frank and capable of specifying guilt; yet given the number of sins committed in the course of twenty centuries, it must necessarily be rather summary. It is also appropriate that it should take into account the admissions of sin already made both by Pope Paul VI and by Pope John Paul II himself on numerous occasions in the course of his Pontificate.'

Here on campus, Father Sal Ragusa, S.D.S commented that he sees the Apology as an important step for the Church, but a step that needs to be the start of a journey for forgiveness. "The Pope's speech shows everyone that we're not above anybody - that only God is perfectand that we (the Church) still must seek forgiveness from God and from other people." Ragusa hopes that the Pope's words will have an effect on students, and will cause us all to realize that this is an opportunity for us to become part of the church and help to improve it as we see fit.

"I hope that students will see the church to be made up of saints and sinners, and realize that the church is not perfect, and requires growth and change - students should take this as a chance to be part of the building process."

Delay Announced in Planned Renovation of Galileo Hall

In a recent e-mail, President Br. Craig Franz, FSC, PhD announced that there will be a "slight delay in the second part of the science center project." According to Franz, the College has postponed the start of the renovation of Galileo Hall from August 2000 to June 2001. The new completion date is scheduled for August 2002. Franz also writes, "A new accelerated construction date schedule is being developed which should enable the new Galileo to be ready after two academic semesters rather than the originally anticipated three semesters." J.C. Gatehouse Hall is anticipated for completion this summer and will be dedicated on October 5, 2000.

Capital Campaign Extended to Raise Money for Buildings

The largest capital campaign of any West Coast Catholic college was extended to \$180 from \$150 million dollars after raising \$137 million since July 1, 1996.

The five-year plan will be extended in order to pay for the new School of Education and Business buildings. Br. Craig Franz, FSC, PhD calls the campaign and its success, "A remarkable moment for Saint Mary's." He adds, "The alumni and friends of the College have been exceptionally generous."

The decision to extend the campaign came at the end of January, when the Board of Trustees voted to use the money to pay for the new buildings. The College, which hopes the buildings will be ready in 2002, has tentative plans to build the School of Education on the field next to the parking lot across from Fillippi Hall. The School of Business is tentatively planned to be built where Sichel Hall now resides.

According to Vice President for Planning and Development Mike Ferrigno, the School of Business will resemble Garaventa Hall and will be three stories and the School of Education will be two stories. The buildings will hold specialized instructional space, offices for faculty and staff, and multi-purpose

rooms [spaces could hold 40-50 people and could be used for meetings, conferences, etc.]. Both Franz and Ferrigno are actively campaigning for money and Ferrigno stated, "We hope to have half the money by December of this year."

The Capital Campaign has three goals: Annual Support, Adding to the Endowment, and Capital Development. Twelve million dollars of the money raised by the campaign will go towards annual support, some of which includes sup-

porting current operations at the school, the library's collections, the Hearst Art Gallery, development funds for Schools, and athletic grants-in-aid. Fifty million dollars will go towards the Saint Mary's endowment fund. This will

allow the College to give out an additional \$2.5 million dollars in scholarships annually. The money which goes to the Capital Development has funded and will fund the building of JC Gatehouse, the Cassin Student Union, the Chapel renovations, the Sports Complex, the student recreation center,

renovations to Saint Albert Hall, the new School of Business, and the new School of Education.

Currently, the only projects not funded are the Saint Albert Hall and the Schools of Business and Education. Saint Albert Hall is waiting for the appointment of the Dean of Academic Resources. It is also being held up by the decision on whether to tear down Saint Albert Hall or to renovate it. The earliest any changes will be made to the building is 2003.

Student Affairs, Erin Hamer won 95.5% of the vote to win the election. She ran unopposed. Amy Uyematsu also ran unopposed for the position of Vice President of Finance. She won with 97.7% of the vote.

Results were announced for only three of the four positions originally scheduled for this ballot, as the Election Committee ruled the election for Vice President of Administration would be held at a later date. In addition to three offices, results for the Constitutional ratification were also announced.

The student body approved the Constitution with 83.7% of the vote. 16.3% of the student body voted against the changes.

Looking ahead to next year, each of the three winners plans on attaining their individual goals and working for the student body as a whole. "One of my major goals is to restructure the organization [the ASSMC] so that the Senate will be more issues-driven. Right now, a lot of it is organizing events," said President-elect Daniel.

Hamer's main goal is better communication between the clubs.

"I would like to work more with the diversity retreat and the diversity clubs. I would like to see those clubs have bigger, more well-attended events."

Uyematsu sees budget process reform as the key to next year. "I would like to improve the budget process, to smooth it out, and help the clubs and organizations get things done. Also, a lot needs to be done with commuter students, working on letting off-campus students know information."

The new Executive Council will take office on May 1.

Logos Withdraws Charter

Publication Becomes Independent of Student Affairs and ASSMC

Logos, the newly chartered debate club of the Associated Students of Saint Mary's College, "withdrew their charter" on Tuesday, March 21, according to Logos President sophomore Andy Brown. The dissolution of the charter means that Logos is completely separate and independent of Student Affairs and the

At the March 26 formal Senate meeting, ASSMC Vice President of Student Affairs Liz Steele said she had not received official word from Logos with regard to revoking its charter.

Logos is funded by The Disney Forum, an educational committee of the Communication Department.

Moderator of *Logos* and Disney Forum member, Shawny Anderson explained the reasons why an ASSMC charter would be a conflict for *Logos*. "It didn't make sense for us [Disney Forum] to support a student club in that way. It [*Logos*] is an academic undertaking. It meets Disney's goal of promoting public deliberation on campus." The publication is now a part of the

Communication Department.

Of the withdrawal, "We came to a point where we had a decision to make. We understand the Disney Forum's perspective on the issue and we hope that ASSMC understands that this is not an issue of their support for us. They have been helpful throughout the process and we appreciate their tremendous cooperation in helping to get *Logos* running."

Now that the publication's future is set, Brown stated, "We are glad to be in a situation now where we can get down to the business of producing a solid publication that can benefit this community."

the decision of the Election Committee was announced. Freshman Class Vice President Kenzi Hales, a member of the Election Committee, said no one but Theresa Fullmer was allowed to comment on the matter.

Kvederis also believes the ASSMC Election Committee did not give him a fair hearing. "In the Election Committee meetings, I felt that they [the Election Committee] were belittling my intelligence." In his official immediate stay, he insists he was not given a fair hearing by the Election Committee, and was not allowed to appeal its decision to any other body but the Committee.

Kvederis filed his immediate stay in Contra Costa County Court

Monday, March 26, and expects a decision on the matter before the conclusion of the postponed election for Vice President of Administration.

The second area of election strife focuses on the failures of election procedures in the Executive election.

In most previous elections, a master list of students was used to check student names against as they voted. Identification cards were also required to be presented at the time

of voting. Together, these two election measures insured the integrity of the election.

This year, however, no master

list of students was provided for voting marshals. "We were told we were supposed to get a list," said Freshman Senator Corey O'Brien.

Because no master list was used to check student names against, there was no way of knowing if any students voted illegally more than once in the election. "It could have been possible [for illegal voting to take place], but after the list of names was alphabetized, it was

determined that nobody voted twice," said Fullmer.

Even after alphabetizing the list, however, non-students and students possibly using fake names would not be detected. "I didn't sit there, but we have to trust people voted fairly [even if identification cards were not checked],"

Fullmer added,

Confusion about voting procedure extended to those senators who worked at the voting table.

O'Brien said there were no written instructions at the table for the voting marshals. "If I knew someone, like a classmate for four years, I didn't ask for an ID, but I did write down their name," said Senior Senator Josie Trujillo, who served as a voting marshal in the election.

Another issue pertaining to voting procedure was the preemption of voting on Tuesday, March 14 and the early closing of voting on Thursday, March 16.

The table was closed early because "somebody didn't show up to run the table. Yes, it could have [effected the results], but I think everybody is doing the best job humanly possible to make things fair," said Fullmer.



Wolves and Giants and Witches, oh my!

A preview of the Spring Musical "Into the Woods"

What do evil stepsisters, charming princes and a towering giant all have in common? Besides the fact they play an integral part in the stories of the Brothers Grimm, they are all going to be taking center stage in the Performing Art's Spring production of the fairytale musical "Into the Woods."

Stephen Sondheim, a man famous for his work with "West Side Story" and "Gypsy" wrote both the music and the lyrics for this play.

In this musical, Sondheim inter-

weaves the tales of "Cinderella,"
"Jack and the Beanstalk," "Little
Red Riding Hood," "Rapunzel," and
"The Baker and his Wife." Yet he
shuns away from the Disney-esque
characters whose lives always turn
out right in the end, by giving each
tale a more realistic spin.

"This particular show moves me very deeply because it gets at fundamental human experiences such as childhood innocence, pain, the surprise that occurs when things go wrong, and the need to pull everything together in order to move on," said Director Frank Murray.

While the first act culminates in a closing scene where all the characters get what they want, the second forces them to face the many realities of life.

"From the first to the second act, the play really changes from fun and familiar to something that is much darker and challenging. While the first act is a lot of fun, and we could send everyone home at intermission feeling great, the show wouldn't have the depth that the second act provides," added Murray.

The play has a cast of over twenty actors, and about 15 others who work behind the scenes.

Professor Michael Cook's *Play In Production* class is responsible for the set design and all the technical aspects of the show. Cook's wife, Jeffra, will be providing all the music and sound cues for the show.

"There are over one hundred music cues and almost two hundred lighting and special effects cues," stated Murray, "Making it very hard for the crew as well as the performers to get it all down."

"It's an ambitious show that everyone involved has put a lot of work
into," said Junior Steven Bossard
who plays the Royal Steward. That
involvement has spanned over three
months of both cast and crew members spending nearly three hours, five

days a week working on various aspects of the performance.

"The result is going to be something that is very special," said Freshman Laurina Esposito who enacts the role of the witch. "We've got a great cast who have made this a very memorable experience."

Making her debut in the lead role of the play, Sophomore Michelle Batista, who plays the Baker's Wife, concurs with Esposito emphasizing that, "The experience has been really fun. The best part was getting the chance to work with so many other talented people."





The Interactive 'Sim City' for the Year 2000



he Sims is a remarkable game, one that takes the classic Sim-City to the next logical step-a "Sim-People," if you will. Basically, the point of the game is to create your own little "Sims" and run their lives. You can manage almost every aspect of your Sim's life (or lives, if you control more than one), from the career he or she chooses, right down to when they eat and go to the restroom.

Yes, that's right, go to the restroom. The Sims does its best to be an accurate simulation of real life, and in order to keep your Sims happy you need to make sure that they are well fed, entertained, and, of course, that they relieve themselves when nature calls. By no means is the game explicit, however, a COPS-like blur appears whenever your Sims take a shower or use the restroom.

Keeping your Sims happy is no easy matter-not only do you have to find careers for them of your Sims causes time to mysteriously fly by. A word of

Different Sims have different personalities, and you can develop close friendships with your neighbors-work on developing that friendship long enough, and a romance might ensue which might even result in a Sim marriage.

t's always been easy for my family to endure the meatless Fridays of Lent. Instead of stocking up on fish sticks and fillets, we go out for sushi.

This past St. Patrick's Day I decided to continue the tradition, and went to Tamami's Japanese Restaurant at 356 Park Street

in Moraga (right next

Rheem Theater). I didn't even know the restaurant was there until a friend recommended it.

I started my meal with a salad, and it was good, but the traditional dressing wasn't as sweet as I'm used to. Still, I can't complain, because what it lacked in flavor it made up for in thickness. But what I really liked about this course was the soup. It had mushrooms in it, instead of tofu, which was a bit of a surprise. At first I was a little hesitant, but they were delicious, and a lot easier to pick up with my chopsticks.

Then my sushi arrived. Unlike some who go straight for the raw fish, I tend to be a little more conservative. I had a

'Wonder Boys' Depicts a Wonderful Odyssey

sing the word Odyssey to describe Wonder Boys, the new film with Michael Douglas, may seem a bit strange, but it really is a picture about self discovery. Douglas plays a college professor named Grady; a pot-smoking,

depressed, and confused individual who wrote a best-selling novel several years earlier, but is stalled by a case of writer's block. He just cannot finish his follow-up book no matter how much he works on it. He is currently on page 2611, and he just keeps writing and writing.

Many other problems are involved in Grady's life as well during the few days the movie covers. He is having an affair with his boss' wife (Oscar winner Frances McDormand), who just happens to be the school's chancellor where Grady teaches, and she reveals to him that she is pregnant. He is being lusted after by a student (Katie Holmes), who happens to be renting a room in his house. And finally, a student protégé (Tobey Maguire) has just shot and killed the chancellor's dog to death because it was attacking Grady. So, he has a lot on his hands.

Maguire steals the show as James Leer, a very talented writer and student of Grady's who is having a bit of a crisis of HOLLYWOOD

his own, or so it seems. In one scene, James narrates what is happening to him as two men take him out of a theater because he is drunk. It is absolutely one of the best scenes in the movie. James is an enigma to Grady, and he begins to wonder if anything James says is true.

Grady has so much on his hands that it all caves in on him at once. He has to handle James, the chancellor's wife, his lustful student, and his editor (Robert Downey Jr.) who is in town to see his new book. Grady has to find himself before he can find the answers to all his problems.

This film is Director Curtis Hanson's follow-up to *L.A. Confidential*, an extraordinary film which was nominated for several Oscars in 1998. Many people were wondering how he would follow up that film, and now we know. Hanson has created a marvel of a picture that is touching, funny, and intelligent to its audience. He doesn't overplay the dramatics too much, and the film moves along from one scene to the next while keeping your attention.

Douglas turns in his best performance in

years as a man who is so confused by himself, that he can't handle all the confusion of the other people in his life. He strays away from his typical Gordon Gecko type character in *Wall Street* and really becomes someone we can sympathize with. He has to discover why he has turned into such a loser, and how he can pull himself out of it.

The ending may play a little softly for some people, but I realized that it is the only logical choice. To end it differently with its characters would still leave us wondering what would happen next. A friend I went to see the movie with said she enjoyed its humor, but thought it was a bit strange, and that some of the characters didn't need to be in the movie, like Katie Holmes' character. Hey, I guess you can't please everyone.

Women Fall in Second Round of WNIT

Gaels handle University of Hawaii but suffer a loss to Long Beach State

On March 16, the Lady Gaels entered the Women's National Invitation Tournament a little disappointed that they didn't get into the NCAA tournament, but with high hopes of going far in post-season play nonetheless,

The women were ready to take on a very tough Rainbow team who had compiled a 20-8 record during the regular season.

The last time the Gaels played Hawaii was at the beginning of the '98-'99 season, in which the Gaels won by three in overtime. In thier most recent match up, the Gaels entered the game with confidence and never let the Rainbows get into the game.

The Gaels held the lead for the entire game, led by Sophomore Jerkisha Dosty, who had 21 points for the team. Her twin sister, Jermisha, was also in double-figures with 16 points and 10 rebounds. The Gaels had a 21-8 lead with 8:55 to go in the first half, but were troubled their free throw shooting, shooting 30 percent in the first half. This opened the door for Hawaii as they cut the lead to six, making the score 34-28 at halftime.

Hawaii began to lose hope in the second half when they committed two flagrant fouls, letting the Gaels get ahead with free throw shots.

The Gaels improved their first half free throw shooting percentage to 75 percent in the second half shooting 42.9 percent overall. The Rainbows shot 32.3 percent. Freshman Julie Morris, Tracy's sister, proved that basketball talent continually runs in her family

by throwing in 10 points for the Gaels.

Tracy herself had 13 points for the team, just five shy of breaking Anne Cooper's all-time SMC scoring record of 1,800 points, scoring all 13 of her points in the first half

"I was really proud of the way our kids responded," said SMC Head Coach Kelly Graves. "There was a very frantic pace the whole game, and I've got to give credit to Hawaii. They had a great season."

With this win, the Gaels moved their overall record up to 20-9 for the season, as they would prepare to take on Long Beach State two nights later where Morris would get another chance to break the all-time scoring record.

The Gaels had their work cut out for them against a 6'8" center named Rhonda Smith, as the 49ers pounded the Gaels in the second round of the WNIT, 73-48.

The Gaels started off the game well against Long Beach, as the 49ers only had a two point lead, 11-9, with 13:29 left to go in the first half.
