David Holquin in "Go-Go" golf cart crash

ASSMC President collision results in injury and angered cow



Noyes named Commencement Speaker

After a week of intense pressure from students and faculty, SMC president Craig Franz, FSC announced Friday that KGO-TV reporter Dan Noyes will replace commencement speaker Charles Garfield.

More than 50 seniors staged a reverse hunger strike on Chapel Lawn last Wednesday and Thursday, gorging themselves non-stop on pizza and hamburgers for 36 hours until administrators agreed to invite Noyes to the ceremony. The protesters' list of demands also included higher prices at the bookstore and a new plan to waste more energy and water on campus.

Administrators say Noyes was a logical choice for a graduation speaker because of his well-known reputation for journalistic integrity. For example, in 2001, Noyes and the I-Team broke the story of a wolf running loose in San Francisco's Mission District. although And police investigators later discovered that there was no wolf, that fact received little public attention because it took over 30 seconds to explain.

Kent Santos, a senior who participated in the reverse hunger strike, says "If SMC (NABET) labor union.



students think there's a more honest candidate for the job, I dare them to find one."

"We fought for Dan because he truly understands the SMC community and what it's about. He's spent a couple hours on campus, and he's interviewed several students. He even broadcast 15 seconds of a 45minute interview with Brother Craig - it's clear to me that the I-Team has gone above and beyond the call of duty in order to be accurate, and to represent our college as it truly is."

Other campus groups expressed a similar vote of confidence in the selection. Mike Ellefson, co-founder of SMC's Living Wage Coalition, says his group was impressed by Noyes' involvement in a 1997 on-air fistfight with a striking member of the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians 66 If SMC students think there's a more honest candidate for the job, I dare them to find one."

"That incident really proved that [Noyes] is sensitive to the concerns of the average citizen. According to Media File magazine, a NABET union member was holding up a sign protesting KGO's handling of labor negotiations, and Noyes told him, 'You a-hole, don't screw up my work,' and then shoved him to the ground.

"This is a true example of the positive change that can come about when goodnatured people are willing to act on their Christian beliefs."

For his own part, Franz said he was glad to see the student body take an active role in the selection process, and is happy that the campus agrees with his choice. His only concern is that students felt it necessary to stage an eating contest to make their voices heard.

"The safety of our students is always our first concern,"

Franz told the Collegian, "and it's a bit unsettling that it had to come to this. There is overwhelming support for Mr. Noyes because of his positive and well-meaning nature, and students didn't have to put their health at risk in an eating contest to convince us of that."

And while 98% of students in a recent poll said they supported the choice of Noyes, some expressed concern with the way the administration handled the situation. Brother Jack Curran, the college's former VP for student affairs, allegedly knew that the College planned to invite a different speaker, but did nothing to stop it.

"What the students need is to wake up and realize is that this isn't about our graduation speaker, and it isn't about Dan Noyes it's about accountability," said senior Rick Weinzimmer. "The college was about to select a different graduation speaker, and the administration took no action to prevent it. What will it take to make them realize they can't just pay lip service like that anymore?"

"Who knows who we might have had as a speaker if we didn't get Noyes? We might have ended up with some irresponsible, sensationalist journalist instead. I'm just glad they did the right thing.'
