Matrix, VP dismissal discussed by Senate

Resolutions to increase funding for the associated students and changes to the matrix passed

On Sunday, Nov. 23, the Associated Student Senate of Saint Mary's College met in the Soda Center to discuss the past semester and the issues that have been brought to light. Old issues such as the alcohol and drug matrix, and recent concerns such as the dismissal of Gina Damiano were all discussed by the senate.

During the public forum, Damiano briefly spoke about her recent removal from her position as Vice President for Student Affairs and how this event should bring up the consideration of a resolution to specify such a previously unprecedented case.

After Damiano's address, Mike Zoll, Vice Provost for Student Affairs, briefly commented on the dismissal of Damiano, the alcohol and drug matrix, and recent Residence Life issues.

The docket began with the confirmation of Jessica Porras '05 as the new Vice President for Student Affairs. In turn, Senator Brad Scoffern '05 was promoted to Porras' previous position as media board chair.

The docket also included Andy McDowell, assistant director of athletics, discussing the new sports logo and the improvement of game attendance, the semi-annual reviews of clubs and media, amendments to the constitution and bylaws, and three resolutions.

The first of these resolutions called to increase funding for the associated students. The authors mentioned that an increase is necessary to fund the academic, diversity, and service clubs as well as the media, to fund all other existing clubs for upcoming years, to fund new clubs and club sports, and to increase events around campus in order to give students things to do on weekends. Jennifer Merlo '05, Vice President for Finance, presented these reasons for the resolution which passed.

As stated in the next written resolution, proposals included requesting, "that the parental notification sanction be removed and used only in the cases of extreme situation," and "that an amnesty clause be added for students who bring peers, who are heavily intoxicated, to Resident Advisors or other figures of authority." After the approved change to add a maximum standard for sanctioning policy violation, the resolution passed.

Finally, the "Resolution Expressing Concern Over Recent Dismissal of Gina Damiano" was brought up. As stated in the resolution, the authors urged "the Senate to take a stand against

the administration's unprecedented actions in removing an ASSMC elected officer without the approval of the Senate," and called "for the administration to reevaluate the student code of conduct and the disciplinary process within the student handbook, in consultation with the Senate."

After a brief commentary on the resolution by John Zabala '06, Speaker of the Senate, the resolution was tabled.

RA's 'relieved' of duties

Residents unhappy with Res-Life decision

Residence Life relieved two full-time Resident Advisors (RA's) from their duties in the Guerrieris on Nov. 17 citing a "failure to perform to expectations" after distributing resource information to a resident who the RA's felt concern for.

In letters from Adriano Amaya, residence community coordinator, Gina Joy Salcido (Guerrieri East) and Katherine LaMons (Guerrieri West) were both given reasons for their termination.

"First you allowed your friendship with this student to supersede your responsibilities as a Resident Advisor," stated the letter addressed to Salcido. "Second, you were not forthright, but evasive in providing information that was requested of you.

"Third, you submitted documentation that did not accurately reflect your interaction with this student.

"Finally, while you did respond to the student in a supportive manner, you did not follow protocols in which you have been trained, including advising and consulting with supervisory staff."

The week of Nov. 2, a resident came to Salcido and LaMons separately.

"The resident had several issues. We weren't really sure what see RA, p3

STD Tests now offered at Health Center

Tests for students available by appointment or walk-in

The Health and Wellness Center started offering testing for sexually transmitted diseases earlier this month.

Previously, if a student wanted to be tested for an STD, the Health

and Wellness Center sent them to the county clinic.

Now, the tests are completely confidential and offered at the center. Tests are \$15.

Many different types of tests are offered. According to Sue Peters, RN, of the health center, there are "tests for gonorrhea, chlamydia, and herpes simplex. We will probably be sending HIV tests to the county STD clinic."

If a student is found to have an STD, antibiotics may be prescribed depending on the STD. These antibiotics are administered directly through the Health and Wellness Center.

As part of the treatment process, the center plans to implement education as a major component of this new service. Handouts and literature on prevention, treating partners, and other sex related issues are available in the center. When a student is tested for an STD, the doctor or nurse administering the test will also discuss the disease with the student to make them more aware of it and how to prevent and treat it.

"One of our emphases here is that we want to do education as opposed to just testing," said Peters.

Tests are only available to undergraduate students by appointment or walk in. Appointments are made only for STD testing.

"If appointments aren't used then we will go to just a walk-in see STD, p2


To remember their loss and enlighten the global community on domestic violence, people throughout the world gathered to

SMC Debate team chartered

Campus club brought back after 100 years

Two weeks ago, the Associated Students of Saint Mary's College chartered the speech and debate team into a recognized club at SMC.

Though Saint Mary's sponsored the debate team back in 1896, the team only had a two-year running span.

It was not until about one hundred years later that the idea of instituting a debate team was mentioned by debate coach, John Hanecak, a communication department lecturer.

However, it was inventor John Macken '62, a former president of the college's Debate Society, which got the debate team in gear and financed their activities.

"It was the hope of our founder, John Macken, to establish a debate team again at Saint Mary's," said Mary Barnes '06, vice president of individual events for the debate team. "John put of flyers and distributed them in his classes in order to get people interested in speech and debate," said Barnes.

According to Kristen Mathe '06, vice president of the club, Macken wants to see "more students involved from different departments, especially the science department."

The members must work anywhere between 40 to 200 hours

preparing for a speech and be comfortable speaking about "international policy, business, history, economics, and key societal values".

In order to make sure these students are well prepared, Barnes and Mathe oversee their preparations.

Barnes' specialty is interpretations and she also oversees meetings, gives students feedback on their speeches, and has the say over who goes to events to compete.

Mathe also helps students with their speeches.

"I had high school experience so I came in with some advantage. Public speaking was just something that I felt comfortable with. I help others improve while improving my own skills," said Mathe.

"Winning a round for our first year was a great accomplishment," said Barnes.

"The team as a whole did really well. Everyone helped each other and that connection really paid off," said Mathe.

Goals for the future include national and state competitions. But for now, the SMC debate team is just interested in doing well with their competition from colleges and junior college's along the West Coast.

Many students found difficulty with registering for spring classes using GaelXpress. GaelXpress ran smoothly through the Senior and Junior registering periods, but encountered problems during the Sophomore and Freshman registration.


"Although GaelXpress, conjuring up feelings of frustration, testing the limits of my patience, and generating indignant consternation, I was able to successfully get all my classes due to my supernatural ability to persevere," said Kenny Mau '06, over his recent online experience.

Ed Biglin, Dean of Academic Development, heading GaelXpress, was not caught off guard this time. He made sure the proper people were in place for any faulty occurrence during spring registration.

While many students were busy registering for their classes over GaelXpress, behind the scenes the system was being monitored from 6:45 a.m. till 8:45 p.m. during each registration day.

Andy Kraus, the Director of Enterprise Applications Information Technology Services, along with fellow personnel, were monitoring GaelXpress throughout the day. They were able to shut down and restart the system, anytime a defective incidence occurred. GaelXpress was never offline for more ten minutes at a time, with the average being about five minutes. "Our goal is to make sure St. Mary's students do not even know we are there. We want the process to run as smoothly as possible," said Biglin.

GaelXpress will receive an upgrade over the Thanksgiving holiday. A new server will be installed, while the entire administrative software will be upgraded. According to Kraus, this should hopefully prevent any further problems that GaelXpress might experience.



SMC participates in WHISC protest

Students, staff, faculty go on'Fact Finding Trip' to Ft. Benning for second year

For the second straight year a group of Saint Mary's students, staff and faculty attended the protests at the gates of the controversial Western Hemisphere Institute for Security Cooperation (WHISC), formerly known as the School of the Americas (SOA) at Fort Benning, GA.

The group took part in the weekend as 'participant observers' looking to gain an educated opinion on the issues surrounding the school by attending three main events: an open house, a mass and the protest.

The issues that the group sought to learn more about during the weekend were: American foreign policy, especially in Colombia, the experience of the Catholic Church in Latin

America over the last thirty years, and citizen engagement in complex is-

sues, said Gary Adler, Assistant Director of the Catholic Institute for Lasallian Social Action, one of the staff trip leaders.

It is important said Adler to go "to a demonstration and see what people are saying there through a critical lense."

Prior to leaving for Georgia, students listened to three lec-

was bothering the resident," said LaMons. "We referred the resident to many different sources – The Women's Resource Center, the Counseling Center, a confidential Blue Phone [the Sexual Assault Response Team]. We referred the student to all the different numbers so they could get whatever they needed no matter what the issue was."

"RA's are expected to notify their supervisor if they referred somebody to any type of resource if they had any kind of concern about that student," said Steve Nygaard Dean of Campus Life.

"We did follow protocol," LaMons said. According to LaMons, there was no reason to document the conversation, because no incident was specified. Both LaMons and Salcido felt they were following the protocol laid out by Martha Gonzales Associate Director of Residence Life at an RA meeting on Oct. 29.

"I wasn't told 'this in fact happened' it was a matter of concern," Sharon Sobotta, interim director for the women's resource center said. According to Sabotta, Salcido came into the Center to seek information for a student. "She didn't concretely know about a sexual assault. She asked what she could do," Sobotta gave Salcido the sexual assault crisis response team phone number.

"We did what was in the best interest of the student, but the Office of Residence Life is now relieving us of our duties for that," LaMons said.

Both LaMons and Salcido are writing letters of appeal to both Mike Zoll, vice provost for student affairs and Br. Craig Franz.

"They're saying that we failed to perform to expectations, but we've never had complaints, ever," said second year RA Salcido.

A petition addressed to Zoll circulated through Guerrieri Park. One of Salcido's residents, Nancy Han '04 wrote the petition, which collected 69 signatures. The petition vouched for the competency of the former RA's and asked for reconsideration of the decision to relieve LaMons and Salcido from their positions.

"We, the undersigned feel that former Resident Advisors, Gina-Joy Salcido and Katherine LaMons were wrongly terminated from their positions," the petition reads. "With their termination, we will lose two of the best Resident Advisors at Saint Mary's College."

"The result of their actions didn't end badly. The student was fine and that should be the main concern: that the student is ok and is doing well," said Grace Evers, a resident of Guerrieri East. "She did everything in the best interest of the student."

Ronnie Willet has already stepped in to take LaMons' fulltime RA position in Guerrieri West.


The event in mind has raised the question, "what else haven't we thought about?"

First, a clarification of what I intended to say in last week's Collegian: It is unfortunate that Gina Damiano lost her ASSMC leadership positionher removal is a loss for the entire student body. I've spoken with Gina and have privately reiterated my sentiments. I believe that situations like this could be largely avoided if student organizations developed "code of ethics" and enforced them internally. Lack of birth control at SMC: Serious issue or minor inconvenience?

Visiting other college campuses, you may have noticed condom machines in the laundry rooms, near vending machines, restrooms, and at bookstores. Other campuses even have awareness weeks for safe sex with pamphlets on all the options and resources for staying safe and healthy. But when you walk around the SMC campus, you cannot find these conveniences

Ever wonder why there are no condom vending machines or contraceptives being sold at the bookstore or even distributed in the health center? We all know that SMC is a Catholic institution where sex or premarital relations are forbidden. But do we really agree? As we know, this is a diverse campus, and not everyone is Catholic. If our views differ from the Catholic beliefs, should we still have to obey and subject ourselves to a campus limiting a safer lifestyle?

Chris Rose, the manager at the campus bookstore, says that there has not been a great demand for condoms and that nobody has really asked him for them. He does not know whether or not condoms are just not allowed to be sold on this campus, but it really isn't a concern for him because he doesn't think it

Would students even purchase condoms if they were sold here? Would students attend awareness meetings on safe sex? If contraceptives such as condoms were available, would our campus be healthier, or would it promote sexual activity?

Here are some of the facts: sexual relations are prohibited on campus, condoms are not distributed, and although the Planned Parenthood phone number is provided on each Emergency Information Sheet on the doors of each dorm, this campus does not condone such behavior. "The would affect the profits of the college...prohibits the cohabita-

tion by students who are unmarried and/or dating partners regardless of gender, in collegesponsored housing" (p. 37, Student Handbook).

There are definitely health benefits to knowing your options when it comes to sexual activity. Planned Parenthood provides women with the proper health care and birth control options for women who are sexually active. Without annual exams, people can find themselves not only with STDs, but sterile. These health concerns are the primary reason why many feel that there should be more awareness on

campus about birth control and health issues regarding sex.

With STD testing becoming available at the campus health center, many think that it would make sense for them to pass out or sell condoms in the health center too. If they are offering STD testing then there is obviously a concern about unprotected sex. Condoms could be an answer for the prevention of further spreading of STDs.

Although birth control availability on campus may not be a great concern or problem for many students, for the few who want to ensure their safety, it can make a big impact on their health and personal decisions.

According to the American Social Health Association (ASHA), it is estimated that over 65 million people in the United States are living with an incurable sexually transmitted disease. Two-thirds of all STDs occur in people 25 years old or younger. Columbia University's health question-and-answer internet service, Ask Alice!, states that 20 to 25 percent of college students have been or are

infected with an STD. It is estimated that approximately 15 million new cases of STDs will be contracted every year, and one in four of these new STD infections will occur in human every year, and one in four of these new Generally, papillomavirus, also known as HPV, genital STD infections will occur in teenagers. herpes, and chlamydia are reported to be the

The ASHA reports that HPV infects more that 40 percent of sexually active college students while genital herpes infects 12 percent of sexually active college students between the ages of 18 and 24, and five to ten percent of women between the ages of 15 and 24 have contracted the infection chlamydia.

Sex: it does matter

Intimacy inevitably alters relationships

Whether you believe in free love or the notion of virginity until marriage, sex is a topic that is on the minds of many college students. Sexual activity plays a key role in any relationship, and couples continually face this issue in their relationship.

For some men and women, sex should be the last thing developed in a relationship. Most importantly, the intimate connection that two people share should be the first to be developed, in which sex will either naturally evolve into the relationship or not occur at all.

Sex can change a relationship in a positive or negative way, or have no impact at all. Two males interviewed who were/are sexually active with their girlfriends both started out with saying sex had no impact in their relationships. The actual act of sex was not as big as the hype that they had heard from their peers. However, in retrospect, both agreed having sex added a new dimension to their relationship.

With sex, there was more physical responsibility for both the male and the female. Not only was there a sense of mutual responsibility in having safe sex, but each also felt a sense of proarea. As it varies from case to case, depending on the type of HPV contracted, common symptoms experienced include wart-like growths or abnormal cell changes that can result in cervical cancer.

Genital herpes is a recurrent skin condition that can cause skin irritations in the genital region.

Chlamydia, a bacterial infection that affects women, is a treatable disease. However, it can cause scarring of the fallopian tubes and therefore affect a woman's ability to have children.

Testing for STDs can take place before or after symptoms occur. Blood tests are usually administered and typically test results are

given within a few days. If symptoms have already begun to show, appointments with gynecologists/urologists, primary care physicians, nurse practitioners, or even dermatologists can confirm any concerns.

Visiting a Planned Parenthood clinic is also an option. To find out where the Planned

Parenthood clinic in any area is located, call 1-800-230-PLAN (7526). Another resource you can take advantage of is the National STD Hotline — they can tell you where free and/or low-cost clinics are located near you, and can also answer any questions you may have about the treatment, transmission, and prevention of STDs. Their number is 1-800-227-8922; and their hours are Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. until 11 p.m. (EST).

Sex: Black tie or casual affair? by anna gates

Sex is sex-right? No matter the couple, positions, or toys involved, ultimately all acts of sexual intercourse have the same basic idea at heart...or do they?

In the ever-popular topic of sex, there emerge two distinct scenarios. There is presumably safe and predictable sex with a longterm partner, and then there is the random, "I don't know your name but I want to get in your pants" situation. And although both involve the action of sexual intercourse, the resulting effects are very different.

There is no denying that sex is a part of college life. The phenomenon of two people engaging in sexual acts without an assurance for future commitment (otherwise known as "hooking up") has become an increasingly popular pastime on campuses throughout the nation. A recent study, conducted at one college campus for The Journal of Sex Research, found that 78% of women and men being studied on the campus had engaged in hooking up at least once. A female SMC student said, "[Casual sex] gives you the selfreassurance that you are sexy...it's the mystery and ambiguity involved that makes everything very passionate and romantic." According to Planned Parenthood's website, by the age of 24, one in three sexually active people will have contracted a sexually transmitted disease (STD). In addition, there are also many negative emotions that occur as a result of casual sex. Without any guarantee, casual sex can be unfulfilling and possibly lead to guilt or regret (despite how sexy you may feel during the act).

Although the dangers of becoming pregnant or contracting a STD are still prevalent, the emotional benefits of sex in a committed relationship are very different than those of casual sex. Papal law or honest flaw?

Students, staff discuss sex issues

Students express concern for the lack of open discussion



Excerpts from last Tuesday's roundtable discussion:

The nature of sex and sexuality:

JZ: It takes a lot of trust I think, for some people, especially in a relationship specifically, not just casual sex outside a relationship.

SN: Healthy relationships take time, they take work. It's important that they're dynamic and they allow for growth and support, and that includes aspects of sexuality.

DW: Sex is so consumerist in nature. It's sold in and of itself... I think that along with that...is this notion that if you're a young person, if you're really having fun, if you are all that you can be, you should be having sex.

GB: I'm struck by how much the media both trivializes and overinflates the importance of sex in the relationship. A meaningful relationship isn't really about sex, its about helping each other and having fun.

On saving sex until marriage:

AM: Saving yourself for marriage is an incredibly symbolic thing to

do for a person because you've given that trust to them, you've given that part of your life to them. On the downside to that, you know, sex is not an easy thing....

PB: I do think that if you're engaging in sex and you're not in a committed relationship, there are some pitfalls, for example, pregnancy or a sexually transmitted infection. Who's going to be the person standing with you if something negative should happen.

DW: I do think that life is long...and that while its not necessary to have notches on your bedpost, so to speak, its part of human interaction to have sex.

SN: I think its possible for someone to be in a variety of relationships before their marriage, and to be sexual in those relationships in satisfying ways without "doing it" and still saving themselves for marriage. Yet we haven't talked about those.

Contraceptives:

SN: We don't have policies articulated, we have practices. But they

are practices not to offer contracep-

JZ: I think it's a real disservice to the health center to not be able to allow condoms to be distributed. ... I don't know what the mission statement of the health center says, but I would assume its something about keeping students safe, and making sure they have happy, healthy lives.

CH: The policy itself doesn't even address the problem that we don't have contraceptives on this campus.

...for those that don't have transportation or means to go off-campus easily to go to Planned Parenthood or wherever to get contraceptives if they chose to partake in any type of sexual activity, it puts a big damper on that...

BM: If contraceptives were more available on campus, it seems like people might be carrying them a lot more....

GB: I would not feel comfortable prescribing birth control to some-body because I know that coming into this job, my own personal feelings apart, the philosophy of the

school here. But in the interest of health I think I can discuss birth control with somebody.

The cohabitation rule:

BM: It seems kind of ridiculous to stop at 2 a.m., 'cause I mean, "Oh it's 2 a.m., can't have sex." That's probably one of the most 'lax policies that's enforced. That and, sadly to say, alcohol. I mean, the matrix, God bless it, is trying...

SN: Coming to a Catholic college, were you surprised that there were policies having to do with sexual intercourse?

AM: It did not surprise me that there were policies about sex. What did surprise me was that it was not talked about, it was not discussed, and it was never even brought up as far as what the safety precautions would be.

CH: The rules and the policy about cohabitation and sexual interactions, I don't think that was surprising to me at all. I think that lack of real discussion of contraceptives and, like Aman said about although we might not ask for it on this campus, that this is a place where you can go to talk about it. Just that alone would be helpful.

What happened to Burley-Johnson?

The truth about the senior linebacker's lost season

Coming back for a fifth year, senior linebacker Ramon Burley-Johnson was looking forward to a great year. He was coming off a season in which he was second on the team in tackles only to roommate, Wes Borba, and was a First Team I-AA Independent selection at linebacker. He also led the Gaels with 5.5 sacks and forced two turnovers. With a new coach invigorating the team and having fans excited about the season, after three years of playing .500, this could have been the best year of all. But little did anyone know, it would be the worst. The first game was

uninspiring, with just 4 tackles in an embarrassing 44-3 loss to Northern Arizona. Students arrived to campus the next day, and with no school on Monday, St. Mary's erupted. The townhouses, off campus, everywhere, everyone was cutting loose. As was Burley-Johnson.

It started out as a little party for friends to come and hang out for the first time of the year, a few drinks, some music, the usual. But then the night went terribly wrong.

"We had a couple people over here, having a good time, I got a little intoxicated," said Burley-Johnson. "There was a girl I happened to be with, and come to find out afterwards, she had an STD. I had no clue, cause she

something you have to let people know before."

When he found out, he went berserk. He started punching things, pushing close friends out of the way.

"Everyone tried to calm me down, and I ended up punching through a window," said Burley

But he didn't just shatter the window. A shard of the window cut through his arm, through three major nerves. He was rushed to the hospital, where he stayed in ICU for many days and many surgeries. When he came to, not only was his football career over, but he also lost the use of his right

The San Fernando native was laid up in the hospital for two months and three days, nearly the whole season. He was released in time to be on the sidelines of the last couple games.

"I'm very upset at the whole situation, my senior year, and my last season," said Burley-Johnson. "First team all conference last year, and then all that, right out the window, literally.

He now has rehabilitation three days a week to try and get some movement in his arm and hand.

"I'm trying to get back my arm, the rehab gets the tendons and wrist and stuff loose, in case I can use my hand it will be ready," said Burley Johnson. "It will take a year and a half, if not more."

Many people speculated that because of this incident, along didn't tell me, and that's with another student-athlete

falling down and hurting themselves on the same night, is why the zero-tolerance alcohol policy was brought down on student-athletes.

"I definitely think its in part with what happened to me," said Burley-Johnson. "(Someone else) hurt themselves too, so they really tried to cut down on the alco-

Burley-Johnson is two classes away from graduating with a major in History, but looks forward to a future of coaching, and maybe teaching. But he also got a harsh lesson in life.

"Life is all about respect and morals, and obviously this girl has very few morals, if any," said Burley-Johnson. "But I can't blame anyone but myself. I've been lucky and appreciative that all my friends, teammates, and coaching staff's help and support. I love them all.'



Senior day goes sour
