

Students react to loss

Opinions on unrealized pledge vary

Looming over students' return to campus this year is the announcement that the \$100 million donation promised for Gatehouse and other capital improvements is fake. Student reactions range from grim to unconcerned.

One concern among the student body was how this would affect the students' ability to obtain their degrees. Laci Jackson '06 knew none of the details, but feared for the state of St. Mary's financial and academic integrity after the \$100 million loss.

"It would be tragic if this loss hurts our accreditation because then all our tuition money will be for nothing," said Jackson.

Chemistry major Jenise Phelps '06 said she had "known for a while that the pledges had not come in yet" because members of the science department were

"surprised it had been taking them so long." Gatehouse, the main science building on campus, was built after the money was promised. "I like the facilities so much. I think it sucks... I hope they don't cut any funding for us," said

"I think it's just bad business... It's their own fault," said Dan To-

Similarly, Jason Butler '06 said it was "ridiculous that they even believed they got \$100 million from someone anonymously. Unless they spent it before they had it, it doesn't matter," he said. Butler found out about the loss from the SMC website.

APASA's Vice President of Public Relations Ephraim Egan '06 learned about the unrealized pledges from an e-mail that was sent to all current St. Mary's stu-

Saint Mary's indirect victim of fraudulent investment deal

The \$100 million anonymous pledge to Saint Mary's College that was supposed to fund the construction of J.C. Gatehouse Hall and other facilities is not forthcoming, college officials announced on Friday, August 13th.

In a letter to the Saint Mary's community, President Brother Craig Franz and Board of Trustees chair Nicholas Moore called the loss "a serious act of deception against Saint Mary's and an undetermined number of individuals."

The pledge was first made by college regent Conrad Colbrant and his partner John Banker in 1997. They requested that their names as donors remain anonymous. The gift to Saint Mary's was going to come from a real estate investment deal they were involved in with PepsiCo. The investment turned out to be a fraud, and Mr. Colbrandt has denied any wrongdoing. On August 5th, he informed Franz that he had lost contact with Mr. Banker. It is believed that Mr. Banker has fled the country.

While the college's operating budget will not be affected, many development projects will be de-

"I think the biggest impact is that we will not be able to move forward on some of the capital improvements that had been anticipated," said Franz. Affected projects include construction of Filippi Academic Hall, construction of a new Recreational Center, and an academic building for the School of Economics and Business Administration. Franz also reiterated that the college is in sound financial condition.

"The reality is, we haven't lost \$100 million. It's been an unfulfilled pledge," said Franz.

Resignations add to departure list and, students raise questions

Since the beginning of the summer, the community of Saint Mary's College has lost several individuals. These individuals include Giles Miller, Director of Alumni relations, Sister Clare Wagstaffe, Director of Parent Relations, and Grace Cardenas-Tolentino, Dean of Academic Advising and Achievement.

According to a public email sent to the staff of SMC, Sister Clare thanked the community

of which she served 24 years, mentioned her continuation to serve SMC in an "emeritus" capacity, and that she "neither retired nor resigned." Wagstaffe clarified, "I have been retired by the College administration at the behest of my immediate supervisor."

The college later announced the departure of Giles Miller. Again, Wagstaffe communicated her thoughts via email. "Giles has served the College he loves so much loyally [sic] and tirelessly throughout his seven and a half years as Director of Alumni Relations," said Wagstaffe.

Recently, the announcement of Grace Cardenas-Tolentino, Dean of Academic Advising and Achievement, was made. With more than a week before the beginning of the 2004-2005 academic year, students of Tolentino were left with questions. Melanie Linney '06, one of Tolentino's advisees last year, saw her advisor at the end of last year to figure her class schedule. "It didn't seem like she was going to leave," said Linney. "We were talking about the future and my classes in the

Linney, like some of her peers, was full of questions. "I asked 'Was it the students?'" said Linney. "But I know it couldn't have been that. She loved us too much. She saw the potential in everybody. She saw the worth and value in each person that came in her office." Students like Linney were given the opportunity to have their questions answered at an open forum where they shared personal reactions to the news; however, no further information on the reasons for her leaving.

"We should have gotten the bill a while ago. For it to come up so late, it's just ridiculous. It just seems kind of suspicious. Someone must have been covering it up," said Egan. Furthermore, he predicted a rise in tuition as a consequence of the lost donation money.

Bonnor leader James Hannon '06 heard the news students of St. Mary's to come

from Bonner leader Gary Adler. "I don't think it immediately affects me. I think it more affected the school and its growth, but I think the school needs to work on other things first," Hannon said. He added that the college should make community issues more of a priority than growth. However, Hannon asserted his faith in the

Stephen George '08, said he heard about the situation from a parent seminar. His belief was that the fraud would have negative consequences for the school if the administration was planning around the pledges, but that otherwise the school would not be affected.

Both the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) and Moody's Investors Service were contacted by the college soon after learning that the pledges might not be coming.

"The college proactively contacted Moody's," said Director of College Communication Barry Shiller. "Moody's basically reaffirmed the college's[credit] rating."

The Board of Trustees has asked three of its members, Denis Brown, Robert Freed and Ray Larkin, to form a the details of what happened.

"They have been asked to address as quickly and as accurately as possible what went on, and then to develop both short and long-term plans addressing the unfortunate situation that the college now finds itself in," said Franz.

Many details are still unclear, including whether or not there were any indications of fraud between 1997 and this August.

'That is a central aspect of the trustees' inquiries," said

Franz said that many people have expressed their condolences to the college.

"I think everyone is looking special task force to determine to see how they can help us, and we appreciate that very much."

Also, in an August 27th email to the college community, Franz said that the Development Office will be doing everything in its power to secure funding to break ground on Filippi Academic Hall as soon as possible.

"There was disappointment, but there was also a sense of relief," said Case. He said that many improvements to Galileo put on hold in anticipation of the pledge can now move forward.



Coach Steve Rammel has his boys fired up and ready to go for the 2004 SMC men's soccer season. Picked to finish sixth in the WCC, Rammel believes he has the talent to play with anyone in the league. If they are to make a dent in the conference, All WCC selections Matt Fitzgerald and David Vedder, along with All-WCC honorable mentions Diego Rovira and Adam Zielske must have a huge season.

Offensively Fitzgerald will look to fuel the charge. Last season he finished with five goals and five assists. His partner in crime this season will be Anthony Butler who had four goals and one assist.

Defensively Rammel will look to Vedder for leadership and poise. He has been a consistent force in the back line since his debut on campus two years ago. When asked what he thought was a strong point of the team, Vedder 06', also known as "Chedder," said "Leadership and experience will be our strong points since we have eight returning starters we

Santa Clara

Last year the Broncos made a run to the semi finals of the national championship college cup, finally falling to Indiana 0-1. Much of SCU's success will depend upon the play of Kelechi Igwe (six goals and four assists) and Tannen Wells (three goals and four assists) last season. The Last time the Gaels met SCU they lost

Ranked just ahead of the Gaels at #5 in the WCC, Coach Eric Visser's Dons look to be the Cinderella story of the WCC. USF has solid returnees with several key seniors who will anchor the team while several young underclassmen look to fill the void left by the 2003 class. In another close contest last season, the Gaels fell to USF 0-1. Look for this year's game to be just as close with both teams being evenly matched on all sides of the ball.

Stanford

At Stanford expectations are always high. With a 3-15-2 overall record and winless 0-10-0 in Pac 10 play, head coach Brett Simon and his coaching staff are on the hot seat. With the addition of a strong recruiting class and the return eight starters, the Cardinal is predicted to finish in the upper echelon of the Pac-Ten Conference. According to pollsters a year of experience may make all the difference in the world. Should the Gaels play the Cardinal this season it should be a pretty even match up. SMC did not have a match against Stanford last season.

Women looking to set standard for Gael Athletics



Women's soccer ready for tough season

Gaels look to improve for 2004 season after falling short of playoffs last year

This season the Gaels are picked to finish fifth in the 2004 WCC Coaches Poll. Under the guidance of second year head coach Paul Sapsford they will be tested early and often. Ten home games combined with a tough road schedule including Cal, Hawaii, and USC the Gaels should have their work cut out.

Fourteen returning players alongside eight freshman will grace the Gaels' bench this season. Leading the offense for the Gaels will be seniors Jenny Barbera, Sarah Burgess and Sarah Takekawa.

One of the biggest stories will be the comeback of Barbera who missed most of last season due to a knee injury. Despite the setback, she was still able to record ten shots, with seven of those on goal. Takekawa, averaging 1.58 shots, started 16 of the 19 games last season while recording 30 shots, 14 of those coming on goal. The third of the offensive trifecta, Sarah Burgess, finished the season with nine points, started all 19 games, recorded 38, with 19 on goal and had an average of 2.00 shots per game.

On the defensive side of the ball look for junior Allison Kop to have a big season. Alongside with sophomore Cali Larson, these two will have to anchor a defense that lost several seniors

Chelsea Montero. The experience and strength that these players possess will be essential towards the Gaels run for the WCC championship.

Joining these veterans are eight new arrivals. Leading the pack will be Stephanie Harrison who totaled 53 goals and 11 assists in her high school career at Murrieta Valley High School. Adding to this talented class will be transfers Genevieve Hollis from Sierra Junior College in Sacramento and Erin Stieber from Lassen Junior College in Susanville, CA. During her career there Hollis was selected to the Junior College Division III All West Coast Regional team All-American Second Team. Stieber, while playing at Carson High School in Carson City, NV recorded 55 goals and 80 assists and was named First Team All-League and First Team All-Region in 2001.

Santa Clara

Santa Clara, under head coach Jerry Smith, finished 14-6 last season. Under Smith's leadership, the Broncos advanced through the tournament with wins over ranked opponents Stanford (1-0) and Arizona State (1-0), and a third round shoot-out against Portland (0-0, 4-2 Penalty Kicks). This will be a major test for the Gaels since SCU is perenincluding Jill Anderson and and Junior College Division III nially ranked among the best in

women's soccer. However, the Gaels answered the call last season battling the Broncos to a scoreless tie. The rematch for this contest is slated for October 15th.

Under head coach Pamela Kalinoski, the Dons finished 5-14-0 last season. Last year, USF had two victories over WAC opponents Rice and Boise State, but then soon declined due to a slew of injuries. Sophomore forward Shuree Hyatt led the Dons in scoring last year compiling eight goals and four assists for 20 total points. The new faces to look out for include freshman defenders Katie Hoban and Kara Breithaupt. Last season the Gaels were able to edge the Dons out to a 1-0 victory. October 10th is the date for this conference match up.

Stanford

Former Gael Head Coach Paul Radcliffe leads a talented Stanford cast into this 2004 season. Last year the Cardinal finished the 2003 season with a 10-9-2 record. Fifth-year seniors and All-Americans Nicole Barnhart and Marcie Ward will co-captain the squad this fall. Last season the Cardinals were able to out shot SMC 21-4 and held them shotless over the last two overtime periods securing a 1-0 win. Should they meet the Gaels this season it will be in the NCAA tournament. Either way they would be a challenge for the

Men's tennis flew under the radar as one of the few Saint Mary's teams to finish above .500 last season. WCC coach of the year Michael Wayman and three returning players named to the WCC All-Conference members and a strong recruiting class, they hope to make a splash in the WCC this year.
