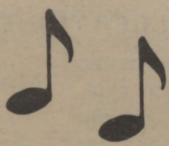

Final Concert To Be Held Next Week

A duo of renowned musicians, violinist Josef Suk and Joerg Demus, pianist, will conclude the 1971-72 Saint Mary's College chamber concert series on Saturday, April 29, at 8:30 p.m. in Dryden Hall.

Suk is a native of Prague, Czechoslovakia and is regarded by many critics as one of the best known violinists of this generation. A great grandson of Antonin Dvorak, his repertoire ranges from the classics to the most contemporary. His performance of Debussy and Janacek, for which he received the Grand Prix du Disque in 1960, is outstanding and will be part of the forthcoming program.

Demus has been acclaimed as a full, mature pianist of impeccable

taste, who offers his audiences musical events of uncommon stature. He is the "complete" artist and is equally at home as a recitalist, as a soloist with more than 70 major orchestras throughout the world, as a recital collaborator, and as a recording artist of over 70 albums.

Included in the program are Sonata for Violin and Piano by Paul Hindemith and Richard Strauss' Sonata for Violin and Piano. Following the intermission, Sonata for Violin and Piano by L. Janacek and Sonata in G Minor for Violin and Piano by Claude Debussy will be offered.

Tickets for this final concert cost \$3 for adults and \$2 for students. Saint Mary's College students are admitted free.

Voter Registration

"Hi! Have you registered to vote yet?"

With perhaps occasional modification, this inquiry was repeated hundreds of times in the Brickpile, De La Salle Foyer and Quad, and through the hallowed residence halls of SMC as the volunteer Deputy Registrars of Voters canvassed the campus registering voters for the June 6 California Primary Election and the subsequent November 7 Presidential and State General Election.

Bob Tenton, representing Contra Costa County and the McGovern for President Committee; Dave Plotz, representing Alameda County and the McGovern Committee; Janet Kassouf, representing Alameda County, F. H. "Pete" Stark for Eighth District U.S. Congress Committee, and the McGovern Committee; and myself, representing Alameda County and, informally, the Ban the Span-No on Proposition A (Southern Crossing bridge) effort; worked through Thursday, the 13th, the last day for registration before the Primary,

accommodating people who had not yet registered.

The provision in the State election code allowing the registration for residents of any California county by any other county's registrar or deputy registrar in cases when returning to one's own county would have been a hardship during the last seven days of registration, and the ruling that California students may register either from their parents' residence or their college address (but not both, of course) made a high total registration possible. In all, about 200 persons here were signed up by the effort (not counting those who had been previously registered).

I have read where the American Civil Liberties Union, the League of Women Voters, and other organizations have criticized other states, and in some cases, filed suit over voter registration practices that have been considered unfair by the groups and deemed by them unfair and hindering to voter sign-up. California, by contrast, has made it very easy for potential electors to register.

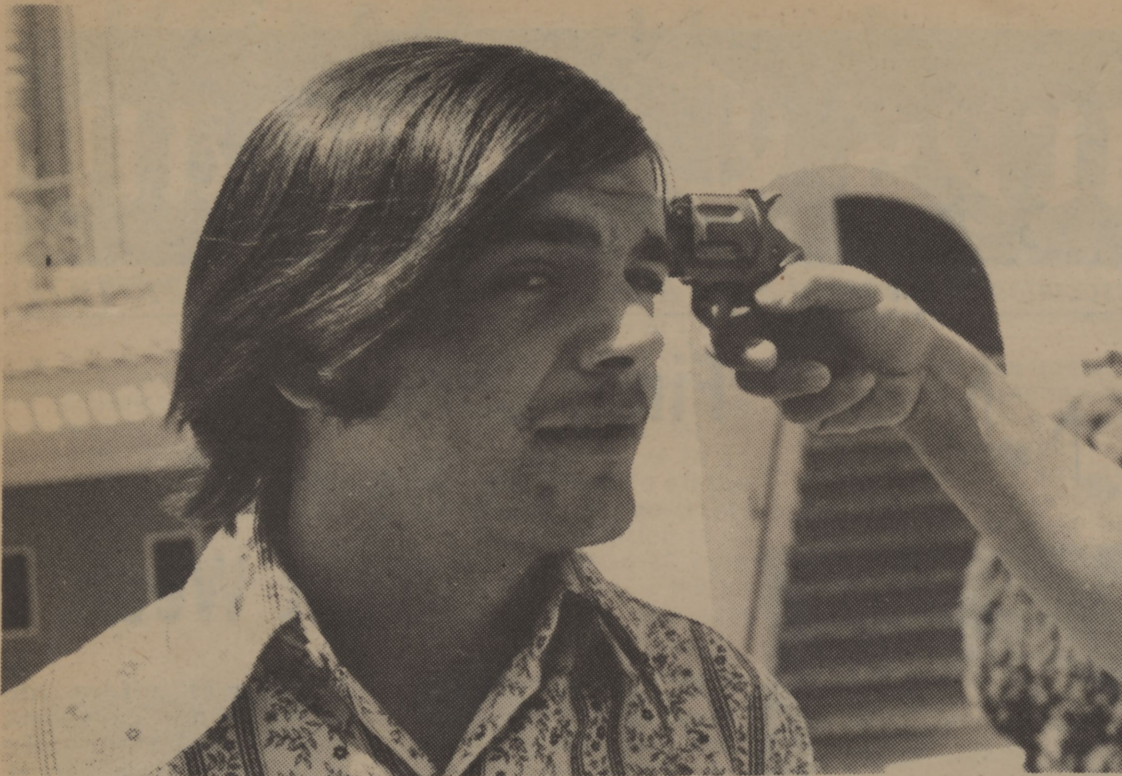
Four or five day a week classes (MTTF, MWThF, etc.) have their examinations at the time scheduled for MWF classes.

Neumeyer Lecture

An illustrated lecture entitled "The Spirit of Colonial Portraiture in America" will be presented by Dr. Alfred Neumeyer, professor of art history at Saint Mary's College, on Monday, April 24, at 8 p.m. in Dryden Reception Hall on the Moraga campus.

Dr. Neumeyer's lecture will be of particular interest to students of American civilization. Among the subjects to be covered during the discourse will be the role of the artist in Colonial America as well as the expectations of the public.

The lecture will trace the transmission of European fashions and patterns and their translation into the provincial style of America. The growth of American painting will be shown in two areas; the children portrait and the emerging of a middle class portrait.

Dr. Neumeyer will demonstrate the apex of achievement during this period through the works of Copley and the reflection of the Age of Enlightenment in the sentimental and the learned portrait, both typical of the age of Rousseau.
