Saint Mary's Grad Still Listed As 'Missing In Action'

Captain Stephen Hanson, who graduated from Saint Mary's in 1961, is among those Americans still listed as "Missing in action". A Marine Captain, he was reported missing on June 3, 1967 when his helicopter was shot down while on a medical evacuation mission over Laos.

It is known that Capt. Hanson survived the crash. His fate since it unknown. Captain Hanson is among the 300 U.S. Servicemen missing in Laos. Prisoners in Laos have not been allowed to write to their families. Complete lists of POW's in Laos have not been released to the United States.

In addition, Professor Henry Schaefer-Simmern, one of the principal donors of the collection, has offered a reward of \$100 for information leading to the apprehension of the person who took the print.

Captain Hanson's wife, Carole, and six year old son, Todd, who was born ten days after Capt. Hanson left for Vietnam are anxiously awaiting word concerning his fate - all community members are urged to remember and pray for Stephen.



Stimulus ... Response

Dear Editor

I am a member of a persecuted and unrecognized minority on the St. Mary's campus: the non-Catholics. I am not now, never have been, and have not the slightest intention of becoming, Catholic.

When I was hired, no one asked about my religious or philosophical views. No one required me to subscribe to any belief. Yet now, weekly, I hear claims that St. Mary's is a "Catholic College" with a "Christian spirit of dedicated faculty and staff." Some suggest that the faculty should teach Christian values.

In one of his monthly editorials in the ST. MARY'S COLLEGE NEWS, Brother Mel Anderson recently attacked "humanism, secularism, skepticism, and hedonism," and spoke desparagingly of "the myriad counter-philosophies and the quasi-or pseudo-values" outside Catholocism.

Though I belong to no organization, I could broadly classify myself as a humanist, and I object to having humanist values attacked. There are many younger people in America today who feel that, in important ways, the Church has failed them, the country has failed them, the family has failed them, their education has failed them, and their elders have failed them. It is not

enough to treat such people with condescending smugness. They command the deepest respect.

It is not easy to belong to a generation that is having to re-create the most fundamental social structures all over again, make sense out of an overwhelming technology and change, and, somewhere out of the fragmented bits and pieces of a whirlwind life, patch together something resembling a whole self.

It is not as easy as you might think to live in a world where so much evil has been done in the name of God and Country and Truth that there is little left to trust but your own hands; where each claim needs to be tested against experience before you can accept it; but where the changes come far too fast and furiously.

It would be comforting to fall back on the Everlasting Arms, to sink down unquestioningly into the pillows of dogma, and stop wondering. But I believe many members of my generation have adopted atheism as a matter of principle, a working tool, and a defense: to protect themselves against being manipulated and molded by yet another social institution: the Church.

If St. Mary's Catholocism is a true expression of Catholocism, then I want no part of it. Indeed, I

often wonder if "Catholic College" is not a contradiction in terms. In television commercials, you may be given lush, flowing pictures of green fields, beautiful people, delight, love, and images of what you cherish. Yet there is always a hook at the end, and you find the beauty only a bait to catch another consumer for deodorants. I fear that a Christian education would be similar: a large, hidden hook, baited with the Classics and Seminars and Arts and Sciences, all used, not to further truth, but to catch Catholics.

Would someone please explain "Catholic College" to me, and show where we non-Catholics fit in?

If God is real and the Church His spokesman, then both will triumph in an arena of open discussion. I do not find that openness at St. Mary's. Too many people are using the College not to explore, but to propagandise a philosophy. I object to this procedure, whether the philosophy be world revolution or world Catholocism. I hear colleagues of mine attacked for supporting humanism; yet others here support Catholocism without realizing that any dogma is incompatible with the delicate process of learning, subtly, to discover and explore the truth, on one's own, from the primary sources of books, people, and life--rather than have "truth" handed down predigested by Church, State, Professor, Parents or any other authority.

We all hold views of the universe, and should gladly submit them for consideration by others, realizing that they might not agree, and that, in fact, we could simply be wrong.

In overstressing the need for a Christian faculty teaching Catholic values, St. Mary's denies its God and its Church. Religion is like love: if you have to announce it too loudly and too often, it simply isn't there.

Methinks the President doth protest too much

Mr. Grow's letter prompted an investigation, on our part, of the number of non-Catholics on the faculty, the number of tenured non-Catholics and the number of non-Catholic department heads.

Of the thirteen (13) lay department heads, (there are also four brothers who serve as department heads) eight are non-Catholic.

Of the twenty-seven (27) tenured faculty members, seventeen (17) are non-Catholic.

Of the fifty-two (52) fulltime lay faculty members, over half are non-Catholic.

There is some uncertainty regarding these figures because Mr. Grow points out, the college does not inquire as to the religious convictions of prospective current faculty members.

Roughly 25 per cent of the student body is non-Catholic.

In addition, answers the questions: What is a Catholic college? What is the role of a non-Catholic in a Catholic college? may be found in "The Goals of the College" statement printed in "The Collegian" last fall.



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

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Lombard's Last Game**Gaels Close Season Tomorrow At Home**

Already casting an eye to next year, the young Saint Mary's Gaels will close out the basketball season on Saturday, March 3, when they host the University of Nevada-Reno Wolfpack.

Tipoff for Saturday's game will be at 8 p.m.

"While we naturally want to end the campaign with a victory, we are also anxious to reverse an earlier decision to Nevada-Reno," Coach Bruce Hale reported, referring to a 94-80 loss to Coach Jim Padgett's club.

Under the guidance of Coach Padgett, Nevada-Reno had proved to be one of the big surprises of the league. Their 4-8 in West Coast Athletic Conference play and overall record of 9-15 is a vast improvement over recent campaigns.

A big factor in the Wolfpack's improved play has been the efforts of Pete Padgett, Coach Padgett's son. The 6-8 freshman forward is W.C.A.C.'s leading rebounder, averaging 17.4 ppg. Saturday night's game will serve as a homecoming of sorts for young Padgett who prepped at Del Valle High School in nearby Walnut Creek.

Marvin Buckley, a 6-4 junior from Berkeley High, and 6-8 junior forward Dave Webber have also played key roles in UNR's resurgence. Buckley is the league's fourth best scorer with a 23.4 average.

Last week the Gaels successfully defended William "Bird" Averitt, the nation's leading scorer, and managed to edge Pepperdine University, 83-82. The following night, however, they dropped 84-77 verdict to the Loyola University Lions.

"I think we played our best defense of the season against Pepperdine," Coach Hale opined. "Matt Kriletich, who had to spend the most time covering Averitt, was particularly outstanding." Hale also pointed out that Vince Lombard, the only senior on the squad, has done a great job of picking up much of the slack brought about by the absence of Mike Rozenski from the lineup. Rozenski, who

has a badly sprained ankle, has been sidelined since the second Seattle game.

Center Lorne McKelvie also had his best game of the season against the Waves. The 6-9 junior from Long Beach tallied 19 points and came up with 12 rebounds.

"We will have everyone back from this team except Lombard," Hale noted. "There's no question," he continued, "but that we will be much improved as a result of the added experience."

The Gaels have a 2-11 record in League play and a 7-18 overall.

Saint Mary's College ruggers, hampered by muddy fields and inexperience, will renew an old rivalry Saturday, March 3, when they host the Santa Clara Broncos.

The Gaels, who were counting on overall team speed, have had the same problems thus far this spring. Their record of the season to date following a 15-10 loss to California State University, Hayward, 2-7. The two victories in the campaign were a 12 decision over Chico State and an 11-4 triumph against the University of Oregon.

"Since we are on the small side and we are counting on speed to compensate for the lack of size, we have been at a decided disadvantage in the muddy fields we have to play on," Coach Paul Vincent reported. The sloppy fields, of course, favor the bigger team.

The Gaels are hoping for the arrival of sunnier weather in order that the speedy backs such as Raul Ramos, Mike Fanucchi, and Jim Datrice can be used to advantage.

Following the match with Santa Clara, the Gaels will face the Old Gaels on Sunday, March 4.
